





#### UNDERGROUND PROJECT POWERS AHEAD

The City of South Perth's transition to underground power is bringing safer streets, increased reliability and better infrastructure.

We're a step closer to fully transitioning power infrastructure underground, with work in the South Perth and Hurlingham areas nearing completion.

Kensington and some remaining pockets are next in line, which will bring the last sections of Western Power's distribution network underground.



The Collier and Manning project areas have been living the underground power life for a while, with those two projects completed throughout 2022.

With most of Western Power's distribution network buried within the City, residents are already enjoying a range of benefits. Underground power offers enhanced public safety

with brighter, energy-efficient LED streetlighting, increased reliability and security, more attractive streetscapes, higher property values, reduced long-term maintenance costs, and space for trees to grow free of power lines.

## Turtle Monitoring Program: 2024 results

The 2024 Turtle Monitoring Program at Sir James Mitchell Park, a community conservation project, recorded an increased number of snake-necked turtle sightings, with nearly 20 nests successfully protected. The majority of nesting activity occurred around park vegetation and some residential areas.

Encouragingly, there was no sign of nests being destroyed.

Dedicated turtle trackers contributed over 68 hours across 66 shifts to track our snake-necked turtles. During an intensive trapping session, the team gathered vital data by weighing, measuring and tagging turtles from lakes Tondut, Douglas and Hurlingham before releasing them unharmed.

Specialised monitoring included genetic and DNA sampling, GPS tracking for movement analysis — and even ultrasounds on female turtles to check for eggs.

Turtle enthusiasts also played a key role by logging sightings in the TurtleSAT app, helping build a better picture of turtle movements and nesting behaviour.





to become safer following a Council-endorsed plan to implement a 40km/h speed limit on local roads.

Joining other inner-city local governments, the initiative aims to reduce crash severity and enhance safety for all road users.

With 194 injury crashes recorded in the City between 2019 and 2023 — many on local roads with 50km/h limits — the project aims to reduce crashes by lowering speeds.

This initiative will be rolled out in the 2025/26 financial year, pending funding approval from the Road Safety Commission.


#### NEW ENCLOSED DOG PARKS UNLEASHED

We've made a big leap for our four-legged friends, opening our first two enclosed dog parks in Como.

Olives Reserve is now a fully enclosed park designed for dogs, featuring agility equipment for an extra bit of fun. Comer Reserve caters to our smaller canine companions, providing a safe area where little dogs can run and play.

These new parks not only give our pooches dedicated areas to exercise and play, but they also ensure dogs, owners and neighbours can all enjoy these fantastic new spaces together. They also offer a great opportunity for dogs to socialise with others, helping to develop good behaviour and positive interactions.

Even though these parks are enclosed, it is still the dog owner's responsibility to ensure their dog behaves responsibly and is always under effective control and supervision. When outside of dedicated off-lead exercise areas like these, dogs must be kept on lead.





Redevelopment Advances

The redevelopment of Collier Park Golf Course is one step closer to becoming a reality, following the endorsement by Council of formal agreements between the City of South Perth and Clublinks Management Pty Ltd.

This milestone allows the project to move forward with the next phase, including detailed design work, advertising construction tenders, and submitting the Development Application to the WA Planning Commission.

The \$19.8 million redevelopment will enhance the 27-hole golf course and surrounding facilities with a host of exciting new features. These include a new


restaurant/café, a two-storey driving range with cutting-edge technology, padel tennis courts, an all-abilities playground, function spaces and a new retail shop.

Importantly, the golf course layout will remain unchanged, and the course will continue to operate throughout construction.

The project will transform Collier Park Golf Course into a vibrant community hub, offering a blend of quality golfing, leisure, entertainment and social spaces.

Construction is expected to begin in late 2025, pending the results of the construction tender process.





#### LAKESIDE GROSSING

The community has been enjoying a seamless, scenic route across Lake Douglas in South Perth since the completion of a new footbridge.

Construction began in February and reached a major milestone in April when the bridge structure was successfully installed on site.

Since then, the addition of handrails and timber decking brought the vision to life. The widening of the adjoining concrete path in May completed the project.

To preserve both habitat and history, the pylons from the original bridge were retained, while the remaining structure was removed.





#### Reusable green waste bags

Did you know you can dispose of your garden waste for free using our reusable green waste bags?

Available at our Recycling Centre for just \$6 each with proof of address, these large 120L durable bags provide the opportunity for residents to drop off up to two bags of green waste per day at no additional cost.

The collected green waste is shredded and composted into nutrient-rich garden mulch. Suitable items include bark, grass, leaves and small branches — but remember, no food waste, animal waste or plastic bags.

#### Reporting graffiti

We are committed to swift action when it comes to graffiti removal on City property. If you spot graffiti, report it via our website and we'll work to remove it as quickly as possible.



## Accessibility takes centre

Stage Improving accessibility at community-level events and concerts is music to the ears of Auslan Interpreter Linda de Rozario.

As Sounds of Bunuru delighted the crowds in Como last year, a group of eager children scurried to the front, their eyes glued to the stage and their hands eagerly moving to the music.

Surprisingly, it wasn't the concert's headlining act that had captivated their attention — it was Auslan Interpreter and CEO of Vital Interpreting Personnel, Linda de Rozario.

As she interpreted the dynamic performances being delivered

on stage, the children were mimicking her every move.

Auslan Interpreters are a regular presence at City of South Perth events, including the latest South Perth Sounds, where accessibility for all community members is always a top priority.

"The thing I really love about doing concerts in the City of South Perth is that you can see the kids come up because they're learning Auslan at school," Linda says.

"They will come to the front and mirror the interpreter. They know some of the signs and will mirror some of the songs," she adds.

Events like these are a great opportunity for Linda to interact with budding signers.

"They'll show me how they say thank you and it's just a beautiful moment where they're able to use it out in the community, not just in the classroom, and the parents are just so proud and I think empowering the next

generation is what it's all about," she says.

Linda knows firsthand how accessibility can impact the lives of people living with disability.

As the child of two Deaf parents, she recalls how a lack of inclusivity meant her parents didn't feel empowered in their role as caregivers.

"I believe access is a vital part of empowerment," she says.

"When my mum was raising us seven children, she just went in blind because the access wasn't there and she just sort of struggled through life," she adds.

"She did a brilliant job, but we were teaching her a lot of the time so the empowerment came from us, not from her. But now, Deaf parents are becoming more empowered so that's what I love about the access that we have now."

Since the pandemic, Linda is thrilled that more local governments are including interpreters at their events, but she believes there is still a lot of work to do in this space.

"When we have an Auslan interpreter on the news, it's only ever for disasters like cyclones or floods or COVID, so the Deaf never hear any of the good news," she explains.

This is why she believes it is so important they have access to local events and concerts that help foster their sense of belonging in the community in an uplifting way.

"There's a lot of prep that goes on behind the scenes for music concerts and the City of South Perth are really great, because when we ask for lyrics to be sourced beforehand or

earpieces or fallback speakers or the right spot on the stage, the City of South Perth always rise to the occasion for us."

Having interpreters at events is just one way the City is ensuring this community is an accessible and inclusive one.

At its major summer concert, South Perth Sounds, the City installed temporary matting on the park surface to improve access for wheelchairs, people with prams and people with mobility challenges; and installed accessible toilets.

In November, the City will host a WASO Connect Chamber Performance in the South Perth Community Hall, which will provide an intimate concert for individuals who may otherwise be unable to attend a full symphony orchestra concert due to accessibility requirements.

Bodkin Park in Waterford is a picture-perfect spot by day, with its manicured lawns and tranquil waterways making it a local favourite for picnics and leisurely strolls. But for Joe Tonga of Natsync Environmental, the park's real magic is unveiled when the sun sets.

Each spring, Joe leads the wildly popular Night Stalks tours, offering curious locals a frontrow seat to the wonders of the dark. With every tour selling out — and a waiting list to boot — it's clear that many residents share his view.

And while the park is home to an array of creatures that come alive at night, the undisputed stars of the show are the microbats — tiny, echolocating marvels that Joe is absolutely batty about.

Bodkin Park's resident microbats make good use of the 40 custom-made bat boxes scattered throughout the area, all handcrafted by Joe himself. Of Australia's 60-plus species of microbats, two can be spotted here, darting through the night sky in search of insects.



"There are a lot of bats around — there are always some in the boxes and they're constantly moving around. When you see one up close, you'll notice they are so soft and velvety — they're just beautiful little critters," he says.

But bats aren't the only nighttime visitors. As darkness falls, the park transforms into a hub of activity.

"When you look at Bodkin Park during the day, you see the beautifully manicured lawn and water and a couple of birds but whoa, when it's nighttime, it completely changes," he says.

"It is probably one of the best locations in Perth to walk around and see nocturnal wildlife." "The wildlife is just mindblowing because there are six species of frogs there," he reveals.

"You've got ducks in the water, frogs, bats and sometimes an owl. It just depends on the night because sometimes it rains and that brings the frogs out in huge numbers."

Joe has a few tricks up his sleeve to catch a glimpse of the more elusive night prowlers when he visits this part of the foreshore, including special lights to illuminate scorpions, which glow under ultraviolet light. He also carries a special device to lure owls into view.

He will often check in on the local ospreys, who use the man-made nesting pole installed by the City of South Perth.

It's easy to see why Joe is described as the "Steve Irwin of South Perth" with his infectious enthusiasm and animated demeanour reminiscent of the late wildlife warrior.

And if you're lucky enough to nab a spot on one of his tours, which usually run from late September to early October, you too will get swept up in his passion for our native wildlife.



## Reaching NEW HEIGHTS

For Maryann Tsai, founder of not-for-profit Reach Her Inc, empowering women is more than resume writing and management courses.

She won the City's 2025
Community Citizen of the Year
Award for her work through
Reach Her Inc, a not-for-profit
helping women from culturally
and linguistically diverse
(CaLD) communities gain
financial independence through
employment. But for Como
resident Maryann Tsai, the
journey is far from over.

At the time of our interview, Maryann was preparing a speech for International
Women's Day, where she was
speaking about the barriers
women face in the workforce.
As part of her preparation,
she reviewed the latest World
Economic Forum's Global
Gender Gap report.

"Did you know that at this rate it's predicted that it will take 134 years to achieve gender parity? That's five generations!" she says.

"I want to do whatever I can to speed that up."

For Maryann, the impacts of inequality are personal. As the daughter of migrant parents, she saw firsthand the barriers her family faced in achieving financial independence.

"It's not just language and culture — mental health, social isolation, lack of family support and employers who don't recognise overseas qualifications and experience all play a part," she explains.

"These are all things my own mother experienced. If she'd had access to better support, her life could have been so different."

Even with a degree in engineering and a successful corporate career, Maryann faced her own challenges when she sought work that aligned with her changing priorities.

"When I became a mum, I felt like I didn't have enough flexibility to manage the school drop-off and still be there for my son's activities," she says.

"It's slightly different, but similar in a sense — mid-career is often a critical turning point for women, where they might face stagnation, increased responsibilities at home, or difficulty accessing leadership roles."

"We have many women who come to Reach Her Inc struggling to find work that fits in with their family life."

It was the culmination of these experiences that led to the creation of Reach Her Inc — not just an employment service but a holistic support network for women.

"There were free programs at the time, but they focused mainly on career counselling, resume writing and interviews," she says.

"What was missing was a focus on mental health and wellbeing. If women aren't mentally well or they lack in confidence and self-esteem, how can they successfully go through an employment pathway program?"

What began as workshops at George Burnett Leisure Centre quickly expanded. The first session had just five women, but word spread fast. Now, Reach Her Inc runs business schools, mentorship programs, internship opportunities and support groups to help women overcome social isolation and build self-esteem.

Today, Reach Her Inc has empowered over 800 women — and is showing no signs of slowing down.

"My goal for Reach Her Inc is to continue expanding our program, creating more opportunities for women to thrive. We're focusing on scaling our wellbeing programs, increasing our advocacy work and transitioning to online offerings to reach more women, particularly in regional areas," says Maryann.

"Ultimately, we want to help close the gender gap faster and advocate for more inclusive policies."

# Caring for our LORE

To protect and enhance Swan River/Derbarl Yerrigan for future generations, we're rolling out a range of exciting projects.

#### • Riverwall project

The City has secured **\$2.1 million** in Australian Government funding for a major restoration project along the Swan River Foreshore near Coode Street. Jointly funded with the WA Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA), this **three-year initiative** will stabilise the riverbank, increase wildlife habitat and improve public amenity.

#### Irrigation upgrade

We're investing over **\$1 million** to replace part of the reticulation system at Sir James Mitchell Park, covering areas from Coode Street to the Scented Gardens and the playground. This upgrade will ensure the park's vegetation thrives by providing more efficient and sustainable irrigation.

#### • Hurlingham Living Stream

With **\$602,350** in funding from DBCA's Swan Canning Riverpark Urban Forest program, the City is converting the Hurlingham Drain at Sir James Mitchell Park into a living stream. The **\$925,700** project will improve water quality entering the Swan Canning Estuary and enhance the park's amenity with native plantings to support biodiversity.

#### • Dogs on lead areas

Following a review, revised dog exercise and prohibited areas took effect on **30 September 2024**. These changes provide clearer guidance on where dogs can be exercised on or off-lead on the foreshore and around the City, ensuring safer shared spaces for people, pets and wildlife. Visit the dog exercise areas page on our website for full details. Remember, your dog must be on lead at all times unless in you're in a dedicated off-lead exercise area.

#### Containers for Change

The rollout of **126 Containers for Change** exchange points along South Perth Foreshore has made it even easier for people to responsibly dispose of their used containers.

Any community member can collect containers and return them to a refund point for a 10¢ refund, supporting local recycling efforts. As part of this initiative, **11 recycling bins** were removed due to high contamination levels, improving overall recycling outcomes.



#### Coffee, crochet and connection

The Dôme Manning Community Room is creating new neighbourhood friendships, one yarn at a time.

Residents are getting more than just a caffeine fix at the new Dôme Manning Café in Karawara. The venue's function space has become a hub of community activity, where local groups are coming together to share common interests and forge strong bonds.

The café has helped revive the George Burnett Precinct while paying homage to its past as the old Manning library.

When Manning resident Kym started a meet-up group in the café's community room to share her crocheting skills and a cuppa with likeminded locals, she never anticipated playing a role in reuniting long-lost friends.

Kym's Crochet and Cuppa on Sundays, which she holds fortnightly, has not only helped crochet enthusiasts of all ages improve their skills, but it has also fostered new friendships and reignited old ones.

"You wouldn't believe during the first session I held, this lady in our area met another lady who was helping me facilitate the meet up, and they knew each other but hadn't seen each other since 1986," Kym recalls.

"It was amazing that they could strike up that friendship again after all those years simply by attending my crochet group," she adds.

Kym started her group through Befriend — a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to facilitating and supporting community connections.

She is just one of several volunteer Befriend hosts who have organised community meet ups at the Dôme Manning Community Room.

Others include Jenna's Coffee, Connect and Colour In, and

the fortnightly Stacey's Casual Crochet Saturdays.

"The great thing about the community room is it is enclosed so I can help people learn new skills without the distraction of too much background noise in the café," Kym says.

"It's also great because we can make our orders at the counter and then someone will bring in our coffees for us," she adds. The City has worked closely with Befriend and other not-for-profit organisations over the years to support community connection initiatives in our neighbourhoods.



Our librarians have handpicked their top books to snuggle up with this winter.




#### TAMARA | Comes the Night by Isobelle Carmody

#### CATHERINE | The Bookbinder of Jericho by Pip Williams


Even if you're not a historical fiction fan, *The Bookbinder of Jericho* is a beautifully crafted story about the power of books and resilience. I dare you not to love it!


