COVID-19 Case numbers

- As of 10 November 2020, there have been 778 confirmed cases of COVID-19 notified in Western Australia (WA) and 39 historical cases. 757 people have recovered.
- To date a total of 508,425 positive and negative COVID-19 tests have been conducted in WA.

Living with COVID – get tested

As we ease restrictions, it is critical that Western Australia maintains our high rates of testing which have been central to our success in limiting the spread of the virus and enabling relaxation of restrictions. It is critical that people continue to come forward for testing and practise COVID-safe behaviours when out and about and catching up with family and friends.

Having high numbers of people getting tested allows us to detect cases in the community earlier and prevent onward transmission. People should get tested at the first sign of the mildest of symptoms.

Community

Controlled interstate border

With just days before changes to Western Australia's hard borders, work is intensifying to ensure every precaution is in place to keep the community COVID-19 safe. Since the start of the year, the WA health system has been assessing, preparing and reassessing its capabilities in response to COVID-19 – learning and re-evaluating based on world events. The Department of Health is working with Government agencies and airlines to prepare for the controlled border changes and the expected influx of arrivals into the State from 14 November.

WA Health nursing staff will be boosted at Perth Airport to meet demands of increased passenger arrivals and preparations at Perth Airport are underway to ensure that passenger arrival processes are seamless. This includes identifying the use of suitable terminals and gates at Perth Airport for the arrival of passengers from very low risk (Category 1) and low risk states (Category 2), ensuring infection control processes are in place as well as steps to prevent co-mingling between the two categories of arrivals. Health screening of passengers will continue for all arriving passengers. COVID-19 testing will be available at the airport for those who fail health screens; and for any other arrivals who would like to be tested.

Passengers arriving from Category 2 states (currently Victoria and New South Wales) are still required to self-quarantine for 14 days and must attend a COVID clinic for a test on day 11.

COVID-19 wastewater testing program update

Western Australia's wastewater testing for COVID-19 has commenced, following extensive scientific preparation and analysis. The testing is a collaboration between the Department of Health, PathWest and the Water Corporation.

The best available techniques and equipment have been used so that we can provide the most technically advanced testing methods, ensuring that the science and objectives help inform WA's response to COVID-19. The initial tests were performed on previously collected (historical) samples from a wastewater catchment area where positive cases of COVID-19 were residing at the time.

While there are still unknowns in relation to the duration of faecal shedding of COVID-19, the initial samples tested have shown some positive results, indicating that the COVID-19 virus can be detected in wastewater sampled from a catchment area with positive cases. It is important to note that these tests on historical samples detect fragments of the COVID-19 virus. The virus is not live in the water and a positive result does not indicate any current community COVID-19 cases.

The focus will now turn to testing of fresh samples collected from this week, to assist with ongoing surveillance for the virus in our communities.

DoH Forward Planning

The WA Health Department has developed comprehensive outbreak management plans covering a myriad of settings, including aged care facilities, prisons, schools, hospitals, remote communities. Extensive stakeholder engagement has been undertaken in the desk top testing of the plans which include, but are not limited to, testing protocols, measures for isolation, treatment of those affected and lockdown parameters for individual outbreak circumstances in both metropolitan and regional scenarios. These plans are not currently available to the public.

There has also been significant work done in building up our contact tracing capacity, and reviewing lessons learned from other jurisdictions, including NSW and Victoria. The period of a lull in community COVID cases has been well-utilised as a period of intense preparation and preparedness.

New COVID-19 mental health campaign – How's your head today?

<u>How's your head today?</u> is a new national COVID-19 mental health campaign that urges people to prioritise their mental health, raise awareness about how to identify when something is wrong, and encourage people to seek help.

Testing

General population testing criteria

Any person may be tested if they have any one of the following clinical criteria: fever (\geq 37.5°C) OR history of fever (e.g. night sweats, chills), without a known source **OR** an acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat, runny nose) **OR** acute loss of smell or taste.

Testing locations

Testing locations are listed on Healthy WA.

Reporting

Notify suspected COVID-19 cases by completing the notification form either <u>ONLINE</u> or by printing out the notification form.
