COVID-19 Case numbers

- As of 24 April 2020, there are 548 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in Western Australia (WA).
- To date 32,590 people who have been tested for COVID-19 in WA have returned a negative result.

Point of Care (POC) serology testing

Point of Care (POC) serology testing as an acute illness diagnostic tool for COVID-19, is prohibited under the Public Health Act 2016 (external site).

Elective surgery to resume in Western Australia

Western Australian public and private hospitals will resume a quarter of their usual elective surgery activity from Tuesday 28 April. Further information can be found on <u>WA Government</u> website.

Testing Criteria

Primary care providers are now able to **request COVID-19 testing** in people displaying **mild / moderate** symptoms **who meet the testing criteria.**

Testing should **not be performed for 'clearance'**, fit for work purposes or return to work purposes (except when ordered or approved by Public Health, e.g. COVID cases who are healthcare workers or other limited situations).

The patient must be referred for the specimen to be collected at either a COVID Clinic or a Chief Health Officer (CHO) approved private pathology COVID collection centre, or Commonwealth endorsed GP respiratory clinic. WA Testing criteria must be followed by persons requesting or conducting testing for COVID-19 (see <u>TESTING</u>)

As of 9 April 2020, COVID-19 testing criteria have been expanded:

General population

Any person presenting with a fever \geq 38°C **OR** history of fever (e.g. sweats, chills) **OR** an acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat) can be considered

for testing, where an alternative diagnosis is not more likely.

High-risk settings

Anyone working within a high-risk setting who presents with **EITHER** a fever \geq 38°C **OR** an acute respiratory infection will be tested. This includes healthcare workers, aged care and disability workers, and Western Australian Police Officers.

Testing will also be arranged for anyone from the following high-risk settings where two or more people are experiencing **EITHER** a fever \geq 38°C **OR** an acute respiratory infection:

- o aged and residential care
- o rural and remote Aboriginal communities
- o detention centres
- o correctional facilities
- o boarding schools
- military barracks or equivalent
- o geographically localised areas with increased risk of community transmission
- o cruise ship passengers or returned travellers (international and domestic).

- On 1 April, under the WA Public Health Act 2016, the Chief Health Officer issued a Direction to prohibit a person from using a point-of-care (POC) serological (blood) test (including an assay or device) as a diagnostic tool for acute illness with COVID-19. Point of care serology testing Direction
- Travel between regions in Western Australia was restricted from midnight 31 March 2020. Regional boundaries mirror those of the state's Regional Development Commissions. Further details can be found on the <u>Department of Premier and</u> <u>Cabinet website.</u>
- WA Premier announced Stage 3 restrictions from 11:59pm Tuesday, 31 March 2020. The WA Government's strong guidance to all Western Australians is to stay home unless for shopping, medical or health care needs, exercise (in compliance with guidelines), work and study (if is not possible to work or learn remotely). Exceptions to this include:
 - o people of the same household going out together
 - o funerals a maximum of 10 people

• weddings - a maximum of 5 people.
