COVID-19 Case numbers

- As of 19 January 2021, there have been 888 confirmed cases of COVID-19 notified in Western Australia (WA) and 48 historical cases. 865 people have recovered.
- To date a total of 697,023 positive and negative COVID-19 tests have been conducted in WA.

Living with COVID

Daily saliva tests for quarantine workers

Daily saliva tests for all workers in WA's quarantine settings will start as soon as possible in addition to the mandatory, rolling, weekly COVID-19 PCR tests for higher risk quarantine workers and the DETECT testing programs already in place. This is a new protective measure introduced to further limit the spread and risk associated with the new super-fast spreading UK variant of COVID-19. Bus drivers to hotel quarantine facilities to undertake testing

Transport workers (bus drivers) who support WA's quarantine settings are now included in the rolling, weekly mandatory COVID-19 testing program. These testing requirements bolster preventative measures, such as strict PPE protocols, in place to protect workers in WA's quarantine settings. Please refer to the announcement for full details.

The 2021 State general election

The Western Australian Electoral Commission have developed a COVIDSafe voting plan for the 2021 State general election. More information is available on <u>Western Australian Electoral</u> Commission website.

The Western Australian Electoral Commission will be implementing the QR Code system at all Polling Places and Early Voting Centres and will be encouraging all electors to have downloaded the Safe WA smartphone app. If electors are unable to download the app, a manual contact register system will be in place.

Wastewater testing in the community

The WA Department of Health has made available online responses to frequently asked questions related to WA's pilot wastewater testing program. See COVID-19 wastewater testing for more information.

Victorian travellers

Following the latest public health advice, travel from Victoria will be permitted into WA, subject to the following conditions:

- self-quarantine for 14 days in a suitable premises;
- present for a COVID-19 test on day 11;
- complete a G2G Pass declaration, stipulating:
 - o they do not have any COVID-19 symptoms;
 - o which jurisdictions the traveller has been in over the previous 14 days;
 - o if they have knowingly mixed with someone from New South Wales or Queensland;
- undergo a health screening and temperature test on arrival if arriving at Perth Airport;
- be prepared to take a COVID-19 test at the airport COVID clinic, if deemed necessary by a health clinician (voluntary asymptomatic testing available for all airport arrivals);
- undergo a health screening and have G2G Pass declaration checked at the border checkpoint if arriving by land before proceeding to self-quarantine premises.

Anyone coming from Victoria that has been in or travelled through a medium-risk jurisdiction in the past 14 days will not be able to enter WA without an exemption.

Queensland travellers

Any person who entered Western Australia after 12.01am on 02 January 2021 but before 12.01am on 09 January 2021 and has been in Queensland after 12:01am on 02 January must:

- self-quarantine in suitable premises effective immediately as announced on 08 January 2021 and remain in self-quarantine for 14 days after arrival into WA;
- present for a COVID-19 test within 72 hours of entering self-quarantine (before 12:01am Tuesday 12 January);
- present for a COVID-19 test as soon as any symptoms develop;
- present for a test on Day 11 after arrival in WA (with Day 0 being the day of arrival in WA).

Any person who entered or wishes to enter Western Australia after 12.01am on 09 January 2021 and has been in Queensland:

- after 12.01am on 02 January 2021; and
- within the 14 days prior to the time the person enters WA,

will only be permitted to enter WA if they are an exempt traveller and, unless directed otherwise, must:

- self-quarantine in suitable premises for 14 days;
- present for a test for COVID-19 on arrival at Perth Airport or otherwise within 48 hours of their arrival;
- present for a further test on Day 11 after arrival in WA (with Day 0 being the day of arrival in WA).

Jurisdictions currently in the 'medium risk' category include New South Wales and Queensland.

Jurisdictions currently in the 'low risk' category include Victoria.

Jurisdictions currently in the 'very low risk' category include the Australian Capital Territory, Northern Territory, South Australia and Tasmania.

SafeWA

A person authorised under the *Public Health Act 2016*, the *Food Act 2008* or, employed or engaged in the Department of Fire and Emergency Services under the *Fire and Emergency Services Act 1998* and designated as a Station Officer, is now authorised under the *Emergency Management Act 2005* to enter a place specified in Schedule 1 of the <u>Closure and Restriction (Limit the Spread) Direction (No. 10)</u> and request or inspect COVID contact information / contact registers.

From a local government perspective, monitoring and compliance of contact registers is only expected to form an extension of routine inspections of premises/places specified in Schedule 1 that are already regulated by local government.

The SafeWA app will not work on a QR code which is obscured, distorted or damaged. Businesses must ensure the QR code is placed on a flat surface (not a surface which is curved). In addition, laminated QR codes can create a reflective surface which prevents the SafeWA app from registering the QR code. The SafeWA app will also not work on a QR code which is not part of the SafeWA system. The WA government is continuing to encourage all businesses to align with the SafeWA system.

Community

Airports

As a result of the new super-fast spreading UK variant of COVID-19, new protective measures have been introduced to further limit the spread and risk of the virus. It is now compulsory for masks to be worn on all international and domestic flights, including flights within WA and within airports, all international arrivals need to receive a negative test result before boarding their flight to Australia. COVID-19 Vaccination Program

The Australian Government released Australia's Epidemiology and COVID-19 Vaccine Roadmap https://www.health.gov.au/resources/publications/australias-epidemiology-and-covid-19-vaccine-roadmap on 7 January 2021. This document outlines the current COVID-19 disease trends and identifies the national roll-out strategy, which includes details of the various priority populations and early vaccine clinic locations. The Prime Minister, the Hon. Scott Morrison MP, and Minister for Health, the Hon. Greg Hunt MP, held a press conference regarding the COVID-19 vaccine rollout indicating that first vaccinations are to be administered from mid to late February 2021.

WA Health has created a new 'go-to' page for the latest updates on the WA Health COVID-19 vaccination program. The page currently includes sections about vaccine development and the WA Health response. As the implementation approach is confirmed for the roll out of the vaccine in WA, these pages will provide the most up-to-date news, information and trusted links.

Testing Criteria

Testing

General population testing criteria

Any person may be tested if they have any one of the following clinical criteria: fever (≥37.5°C) OR history of fever (e.g. night sweats, chills), without a known source **OR** an acute respiratory infection (e.g. shortness of breath, cough, sore throat, runny nose) **OR** acute loss of smell or taste.

Testing locations

Testing locations are listed on Healthy WA.

Reporting

Notify suspected COVID-19 cases by completing the notification form either <u>ONLINE</u> or by printing out the notification form.

Series of National Guidelines (SoNG)

The latest iteration was released on 12 January 2021.

Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC)

The Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC) is the key decision-making committee for health emergencies. It is comprised of all state and territory Chief Health Officers and is chaired by the Australian Chief Medical Officer.

The AHPPC has an ongoing role to advise the Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council (AHMAC) on health protection matters and national priorities. AHPPC is also tasked with the role of mitigating emerging health threats related to infectious diseases, the environment as well as natural and human made disasters.
