

Stakeholder Engagement Report May 2021







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1.0 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of South Perth is undertaking a major review of the City's Strategic Community Plan (SCP) 2020-2030. This report details the results of the stakeholder engagement undertaken by the City of South Perth in conjunction with Research Solutions to determine the aspirations of the community to form the outcomes and strategies within each one of the four strategic directions.

These strategic directions are:

- Community
- Economy
- Environment (Built and Natural)
- Leadership.

The stakeholder engagement comprised of a face-to-face community workshop, a business breakfast forum; a youth movie night; an online workshop and an online survey with a sample of interviews with residents and visitors to the Manning Farmers Market and in Mindeerup / Mends Street and hard copy surveys. The total sample for the survey was 567, of which 511 or 90.1% of survey participants were residents of the City of South Perth and 7.4% (42) were business owners.

1.1 The Survey Outcomes

1.1.1 Descriptions of the City of South Perth

The key words which survey participants associated with the City of South Perth were:

- Beautiful
- Convenient
- Friendly
- Green
- Safe
- Vibrant
- Clean
- River
- Community

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1.1.2 The Priorities

Within each of the four strategic directions there are a series of priorities which were tested in the survey (shown under each strategic direction below). These priorities are drawn from two sources in the survey:

- (i) The existing SCP priorities under each strategic direction
- (ii) Additional priorities which survey participants identified and felt would help the City achieve its aspiration for each strategic direction

The priorities under each strategic direction are listed below in order from the top, with the additional priorities identified by survey participants (point 2 above) slotted in priority order in each category. These latter priorities are drawn from gaps in the 2020-2030 SCP priorities identified by survey participants as relevant to the current environment and have been inserted according to the level of support they received (this the level of support may be understated as the priority was identified by the survey participant and not provided as part of the original list). The additional priorities are marked with a '+' in front of the priority in the list below.

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Figure 1 The Community Priorities



More detail about the priorities in each strategic direction is provided below.

(1) Strategic Direction – Community

The key emerging priorities from the stakeholder engagement in order of priority identified in the survey were:

- 1st Adding new infrastructure and facilities to bring the community together
- = 2nd Provide a range of community events that encourage cohesion in the community
- = 2nd Support residents and community groups to improve and foster local growth.

In addition to the three key emerging priorities above stakeholders identified additional gaps to be included under the strategic direction – community:

- + Enhance safety and security (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- Reinforce City's identity and amenity (a priority in the current SCP)

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- + Inclusivity and diversity (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- Integrate local history with facilities and developments (a priority from the previous SCP).

(2) Strategic Direction - Economy

The key emerging priorities from the stakeholder engagement in order of priority identified in the survey were:

- 1st Revitalise underutilised commercial areas
- 2nd Support a network of neighbourhood hubs
- 3rd + Use events and attractions to attract visitors (identified as a gap in the current SCP).

Other issues of importance were:

- + Encourage and support local business and employment (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- + Increase use and development of the foreshore (identified as a gap in the current SCP).

(3) Strategic Direction - Environment (Built and Natural)

The key emerging priorities from the stakeholder engagement in order of priority identified in the survey were:

- 1st Retain and enhance our open-spaces to attract and cater for all generations (including more trees and shade on the foreshore
- 2nd Retain our unique local character
- 3rd + Traffic management including parking (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- 4th Biodiversity and encourage residents to take ownership of looking after the City's natural environment.

Other issues of importance were:

- + Support waste management and recycling (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- An affordable, useable integrated local transport system (a priority in the current SCP)
- Vibrant hubs and neighbourhoods (a priority in the current SCP)
- + Expand and improve cycle-ways (identified as a gap in the current SCP)
- + A sustainable Local Government with zero emissions (identified as a gap in the current SCP).

(4) Strategic Direction - Leadership

The key emerging priorities from the stakeholder engagement in order of priority identified in the survey were:

- = 1st Support and assist residents and community groups to achieve local growth and improvement
- = 1st Decisive, strong and committed leader who acts on behalf of residents; the addition of the words decisive and strong, these words were identified as a gap in the current SCP wording.

Other issues identified as gaps in the current SCP objectives and of importance were:

- + Consult with and listen to residents
- + Local community first
- + Focus on liveability
- + Honesty and integrity.

These have been developed from the open-ended responses when survey participants were asked what gaps, if any existed in the Strategic Direction- Leadership.

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1.1.3 Important issues for the City to address over the next 10-years

The issues which the community wished the City to address over the next 10-years (some are already addressed in the SCP) were diverse and included:

- Improving the safety of the area
- More regular events and attractions and free community events
- Better public transport
- Improvements in traffic management
- Plant more trees and provide more shade
- Limit high rise development
- Support for small business.

1.2 High level outcomes of the Face to Face Engagement

The face-to-face engagement activities identified very similar issues to those emerging from the survey. Across activities, two themes emerged consistently:

- More events and activities, including markets, festivals, concerts and family-friendly, community events
- Transport-related issues, including traffic management, improved public transport including new modes of transport (train, light rail and electric or driverless vehicles), extended and improved bike and pedestrian network, more shade and parking for cars and bikes.

Other key themes from the face-to-face engagement activities differed somewhat by group and included:

- From the business breakfast forum: supports for local businesses, ranging from advertising the City of South Perth as a destination, marketing and promotion assistance generally, business development and connections and networking opportunities
- From the face-to-face community workshop: services and facilities, including health care, mental health and aged care services, transport services and facilitating community connections.

The issue of development was raised consistently. While limiting high-rise development was important to many participants, there were a number (notably younger people and business people) who felt that the City should be more densely populated.

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2.0 INTRODUCTION

The City of South Perth contracted Research Solutions to review and analyse the stakeholder engagement activities for its major review of the City's Strategic Community Plan (SCP) 2020-2030.

The object of the extensive stakeholder engagement was to determine the stakeholder aspirations and to prioritise the outcomes and strategies within each of the four broad categories which form the strategic directions within the SCP.

2.1 The Purpose

The purpose of this report is to compile and document the raw data gathered from the stakeholder engagement activities including the survey and feed it into the City's Strategic Community Plan Review process. The stakeholder engagement focused on:

- Determining stakeholder aspirations
- Determining stakeholder priorities within each area of the SCP
- Identifying any additional areas to be considered for inclusion in the SCP Review.

2.2 Methodology

The stakeholder engagement was divided into two parts:

Part I – In-depth research comprising a series of face-to-face and online stakeholder engagement activities.

Part II – an online and hard copy survey of residents, business owners, workers, students, tourists and anyone who visits the City.

Stakeholder engagement activities were advertised in multiple formats and promoted via multiple channels including the City's website, *Your Say South Perth* (the City's online engagement platform), Facebook, the e-Newsletter and emails reaching out to community groups.

Part I – The In-depth Stakeholder Engagement

The in-depth stakeholder engagement focused on a wide range of stakeholders including the broader community and members from specific communities and advisory groups including:

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2.2.1 Face-to-face community workshop

The face-to-face community workshop was hosted at the City of South Perth Civic Centre on Wednesday 24 February 2021 between 6pm and 8.30pm. Thirty-one people from the City's community, action and advisory groups and volunteer base attended the event. When sent the invitation to attend, participants were asked to submit photos of the things they loved about South Perth. Several photographs were received and strongly reflected the river and green and open spaces.

2.2.2 Business Breakfast Forum

The business breakfast workshop was hosted on Thursday 4 March 2021 between 7am and 9am at South Perth Community Hall. This event was run in partnership with a non-profit organisation Business Station, joining an existing scheduled activity to raise awareness of the SCP and canvas opinions from the business community. A total of 54 business owners attended.

2.2.3 Youth Movie Night

A Youth Movie Night was held at South Perth Community Hall on Friday 5 March 2021 between 5.00pm and 8.00pm. The stakeholder engagement was allotted a 40-minute period at the beginning of the session.

A total of 86 people attended. The core group of attendees were members of South Perth Youth Network (SPYN), a group of young people familiar with the City and comfortable engaging. Other groups of young people from local boarding colleges also attended the session. Unfortunately, some of these students did not bring a smart device with them and their responses could not be captured through the session. The session used the Mentimeter extensively to co-ordinate the responses of such a large group.

2.2.4 Online Community Workshop

An online workshop for members of the community was held on Wednesday 10 March 2021 between 6.30pm and 8pm. The purpose of this session was to provide the community with another way to be involved in the stakeholder engagement. Participants were recruited on an opt-in basis and there were 10 attendees.

The session was attended remotely by six people from their own homes. A group of four met physically at the City of South Perth, and joined the session via Zoom. Difficulties with the microphone meant this group could not contribute to the main discussion and essentially ran a parallel session. The session was facilitated by the City of South Perth's Manager of Stakeholder and Customer Relations.

Part II – The Survey

The survey was developed in conjunction with the City's Stakeholder Engagement team and originally planned to launch on Monday 1 February 2021. However, the COVID-19 lock-down at the beginning of February 2021 delayed the beginning of the stakeholder engagement to the middle of February and the survey was launched on Monday 15 February with the data collection period concluding on Monday 15 March 2021.

Research Solutions programmed and tested the survey at the commencement of the data collection phase. The City of South Perth, through its networks and existing contact lists and database was responsible for the distribution of the survey links.

At the conclusion of the data collection process and after the data file had been checked, cleaned and duplications removed, a total of 567 community members participated in the survey. 511 (90.1%) lived in the City of South Perth.

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The survey was provided to the community through the distribution channels listed below:

- E-newsletter (12,000)
- Vision 2027 database (756 people)
- Business e-newsletter (684 local businesses)
- Club Spirit (100 sporting clubs)
- Inclusive Community Accessibility Group
- Aboriginal Reference Group
- South Perth Youth Network
- The education system: (13 schools, 8 Parent & Citizens, 25 early years services and playgroups)
- Action/community groups (7)
- Local politicians.

A series of 136 intercept interviews were conducted at Manning Farmers Markets and at Mindeerup / Mends Street, taking the survey to places where stakeholders congregate. The interviews were conducted by trained professional interviewers using iPads to enter the data directly into the online survey. Interviewers were visibly branded with City of South Perth t-shirts and badges. Interviewers handed out postcards promoting the SCP Review and the stakeholder engagement. The City arranged to use coffee vouchers as a 'thank you' for participation. The coffee vouchers were roughly equally divided among the three coffee vans at the Markets and three local coffee shops in Mends Street.

The intercept interviews specifically targeted men in general, young people in general and young men in particular as these groups tend to be under represented in online surveys and the intercept interviews helped to balance the sample by delivering:

- Almost half of all responses (48%) from the 18-34 age group
- An even higher proportion of responses (61.3%) from the 18-24-year age group, and
- A third (32%) of all responses from men.

Hard copies of the survey were available at the City's libraries and the Civic Centre with the City subsequently entering the data into the online survey.

2.3 Limitations

The survey was widely advertised and made available through Your Say South Perth, the City's online engagement platform, as well as via email to those people for whom the City had email contact details. Thus, the survey should be read as indicative of needs and expectations of the stakeholders and community the survey engaged with. The limitations of the approach used include:

- (i) Sample for this stakeholder engagement is skewed away from males (40.4% of survey participants), but the age coverage is reasonably good with 40.2% of respondents aged under the age of 45. The representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander respondents is similar to the population and 7.8% of respondents have a disability or care for someone with a disability. Any differences between males and females and the population and other groups have been highlighted in the report.
- (ii) The sampling process imposed for the project is one of convenience rather than stratified random sample. Stratified random process provides wide coverage of the study's population where every person has an equal chance of being selected and invited to participate.

This process generally relied upon survey participants hearing about the survey and then seeking out the opportunity to participate via Your Say South Perth or through the distribution of invitations to existing lists held by the City of South Perth. As a result, whilst the demography of the sample is reasonable coverage, it is unclear how representative the sample is of all sections of the population.

(iii) While every effort has been made by Research Solutions to identify and remove duplicate completions of the survey, it is not possible to be absolutely sure that all duplications have been

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removed. This is the result of the sampling and invitation distribution method employed for the stakeholder engagement process, where people receive multiple invitations through the lists that they were on and the link did not prohibit respondents from undertaking the survey multiple times if they wished. That said, the consultants carefully identified and removed duplicate and multiple completions based on:

- a) Names provided for the competition entry
- b) Names provided for requests to be kept up to date about the project
- c) Email addresses provided
- d) Telephone numbers provided
- e) IP addresses and cross-checking by participant demographics to ensure that unique respondents were not inadvertently removed.

Feedback from the engagement activities should be read as indicative of the needs and expectations of stakeholders and the community. Limitations for the face-to-face stakeholder engagement include:

(i) The City engaged with selected communities at specific workshops including the business community

The City has made significant effort to engage as widely as possible; however, there may be groups who feel their feedback is not being captured.

(ii) Every effort has been made by Research Solutions to fairly and faithfully present the views of workshop participants as expressed at the time of the engagement; however, the views captured may not fully represent the breadth of opinion expressed.

2.4 Lessons Learned

The key lessons learned from the stakeholder engagement included:

Intercept interviewing proved a useful tool for:

- Boosting the sample size
- · Reaching beyond the people who usually participate and including 'new' voices and
- Correcting for traditionally under-represented groups (and thereby improving data quality overall).

The key learnings from the **Business Breakfast Forum** is that Mentimeter can be a highly effective method of extracting a large volume of information from people in a short space of time.

Its primary drawback is that it provides no opportunity to further explore responses.

There were positive and negative features of the **Youth Movie Night**. At its core, there were a number of engaged young people who provided thoughtful information throughout the session. However, the session encountered a number of difficulties, including:

- Although asked to do so, few students in the school groups attending had a smart device with them and neither the City nor the consultants could supply everyone with a tablet or phone to use. Unable to participate, many younger students from the school groups became disruptive and encouraged peers who were participating to also be disruptive. The behaviour required stronger moderation, assistance from all representatives of the City and consulting team and critically, the intervention of the school chaperones to manage effectively.
- The school groups arrived late, meaning the session had already started as half the participants were filing in, further disrupting the session.
- The number of attendees made it difficult to implement the intended questioning strategies and explore concepts of interest.

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Future sessions would benefit from some refinement, including:

- Smaller, more targeted sessions with older youth (possibly fourteen years and over)
- Asking fewer questions
- Contingency planning: the success of the session was connected to all participants having a smart device with them
- Different room configuration: the room was set up to watch a movie (which was the main purpose of the evening), not to facilitate a discussion
- While boarding school students are an important community to consider, it may be more appropriate to capture their views through a different channel, particularly the younger students
- Potentially, members of SPYN taking a more active role in large-format workshops.

2.5 The Format of the Report

The report is divided into two sections:

- Section 3 Survey Results
- Section 4 Face-to-face Stakeholder Engagement Results.

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3.0 SURVEY RESULTS

3.1 Describing the City of South Perth

Survey participants were asked to describe the City of South Perth in three words. The word cloud below summarises the responses:



The most common words used to describe the City were "beautiful" and "convenient", with other key words identified in the bar chart below.




Figure 2 How the community describes the City of South Perth

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3.2 The Priorities for the four Strategic Directions

In the City's current Strategic Community Plan (SCP) 2020-2030, the community's aspirations and priorities are grouped into four strategic directions of Community, Economy, Environment (Built and Natural) and Leadership.

These four Strategic Directions were used in the stakeholder engagement in the survey and face-to-face activities to determine stakeholders' aspirations and priorities.



3.2.1 Strategic Direction: Community

The SCP aspiration for Community is a *diverse, connected, safe and engaged community* and the survey identified the priorities within the Community Strategic Direction as follows:

- (i) Add new infrastructure and facilities to bring the community together.
- (ii) = Provide a range of community events that encourage cohesion in the community.
- (ii) = Support residents and community groups to improve and foster local growth.
- (iii) Reinforce the City's identity and amenity.
- (iv) Integrate local history with the facilities and developments.

The order of priority was similar amongst all groups of survey participants; however, some groups of stakeholders placed slightly greater priority on particular priorities listed:

- Providing a range of community events that encourages cohesion in the community declined slightly in importance with age. The greatest support for this objective was in the under 55 age group.
- Supporting residents and community groups to improve and foster local growth increases in importance with age particularly amongst the 55 plus age group, amongst females and amongst business owners and workers. However, this still remains second in importance to adding new infrastructure facilities to bring the community together.

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- *Reinforcing the City of South Perth's identity and amenity* increases in importance with age and particularly amongst the 55 plus age group.
- Integrating local history with facilities and developments remains the least important priority
 overall but does increase in importance with age and is most important to the 65 plus age
 group.

Other Community considerations

Other issues which survey participants felt would lead to the City's aspiration of a diverse, connected, safe and engaged community included:

- More events / opportunities for the community to engage with each other (19.9%).
 - This issue reinforces the desire for a range of community events to encourage cohesion in the community.
- Traffic management roads / parking / pedestrian and cycling facilities public transport (18.3%).
 - Note: local transport system is covered under the Environment (Built) in section 3.2.3.
- Safety and security improve police presence / CCTV / patrol teams / police station (14.9%).
- Environmental more trees / public open space / shade / animals pet friendly (12.4%)
 - These issues would be better included in section 3.2.3.
- More inclusive multi-cultural / old / disabled / homeless / Aboriginal community (11.0%).
 - There is no objective which specifically addresses diversity in this community objective and should be considered.
- Engage and consult with the community / listen to and inform residents (10.1%).
 - This objective is covered in section 3.2.4



3.2.2 Strategic Direction: Economy

The current SCP aspiration for Economy is *a thriving City activated by innovation, attractions and opportunity*. The priorities of survey participants to drive the economy of the City are:

- (i) Revitalise under-utilised commercial areas.
- (ii) Support a network of community hubs.
- (iii) Use events and attractions to grow tourism.

Q5. You told us in 2017 that you wanted a thriving City activated by innovation, attractions and opportunities. These are the priorities that were identified to drive the economy of the City: Please sort these priorities into order starting with the one you feel is most important or highest priority (rank 1) through to the one you feel is the least important (rank 3). (n=515-521)

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The use of events and attractions to grow tourism had most support amongst the 18 - 54 age group and was the least supported option amongst residents and business owners participating in the survey.

Other Economy considerations

Other priorities for creating a thriving City activated by innovation, attractions and opportunities suggested, as per the current aspiration, were as follows:


- Increasing the number of community events (22.4%).
- Improve traffic / parking / footpaths and roads (13.3%).
 - This objective is included in Environment (Built) in the next section 3.2.3.
- Environmental issues; e.g. open spaces, trees, electric vehicle charging, solar power, waste issues (11.7%).
 - These issues would be better included in the next objective in section 3.2.3.
- Encourage and support local business and employment (10.4%).
- Improve community facilities; e.g. RAF, Music Hall, Cinema (9.4%).
 Covered in 3.2.1 above.
- Increased use and development of the foreshore (9.1%).

3.2.3 Strategic Direction: Environment (Built and Natural)

The aspiration for the Environment (Built and Natural) as a *sustainable urban neighbourhood* had the following priorities amongst survey participants:

- (i) Retain and enhance our open-spaces to attract and cater for all generations.
- (ii) Retain our unique local character.
- (iii) Promote biodiversity and encourage residents to take ownership of looking after the City's natural environment.
- (iv) =Vibrant hubs and neighbourhoods throughout the City; and
- (iv) =An affordable, easy to use, integrated local transport system linking all suburbs accessible.

Q7. In 2017, sustainable urban neighbourhoods was the aspiration for this category and these are the priorities that were identified to achieve it: Please sort these priorities into order starting with the one you feel is most important or highest priority (rank 1) through to the one you feel is the least important (rank 5). (n=513-525)

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These priorities are similar across all groups of participants surveyed except the business community who reported a different order of priority as shown below:

- (i) Vibrant hubs and neighbourhoods throughout the City.
- (ii) = Promote biodiversity and encourage residents to take ownership of looking after the City's natural environment; and
- (ii) = Retain and enhance our open spaces that attract and cater for all generations.
- (iii) Retain our unique local character.
- (iv) An affordable, easy to use, integrated local transport system making all suburbs accessible.

Retaining the unique local character of the City of South Perth was most important to the 55 plus age group though this still rated second with this age group behind retaining and enhancing open spaces.

Other considerations in the Environment (Built and Natural)

Survey participants suggested that other priorities to help the City achieve its aspiration of a sustainable urban neighbourhood included:

- Waste management supporting recycling (including green waste bins and rubbish disposal) (15.3%).
- More trees including the foreshore and more shade (14.7%) encompassed in the top priority above).
- Limit development and keep high-rise and infill to specific areas (12.4%).
- Expand and improve cycleways and provide bike hire (9.0%).
- Parks, open spaces and maintain the public space and foreshore area (8.7%) encompassed in the top priority above).
- Renewable energy / zero emissions / a sustainable LGA including electric charging and solar power (8.3%).

3.2.4 Strategic Direction: Leadership

The aspiration for Leadership is for *a visionary and influential local government* to achieve these two priorities which are perceived to be equally important to survey participants:

- (i) = Support and assist residents and community groups to achieve local growth and improvement;
- (i) = A committed leader who acts on behalf of residents.




Figure 6 Council and Leadership priorities

Q9. The aspiration is for a visionary and influential local government. The two priorities to achieve this are listed below. Which of these do you feel to be the highest priority? Please sort these priorities into order starting with the one you feel is most important or highest priority (rank 1) through to the one you feel is the least important (rank 2). (n=524)

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Amongst survey participants the perceived importance of leadership increased with age from 34.4% in the 18-34 age group to 70.4% in the 75 plus age group. By comparison, supporting and assisting residents and community groups was placed as the first priority by two-thirds of the 18-34 age group responding to the survey.

Other Leadership considerations

Survey participants felt that the following issues would help Council to achieve its aspiration of a visionary and influential local government as follows:

- Consult with and listen to residents (19.4%).
- Honesty and integrity with no personal agendas (10.8%).
- Put more focus and more concern on the environment (9.3%).
- Make decisions for the whole of the community not influenced by minority groups or outside interests / let everyone have a say (8.7%)
- Seek advice and expertise / listen to stakeholders, community groups, create advisory groups and look to successes elsewhere (7.9%).
- Be decisive / strong / courageous and charismatic (7.5%).
- More approachable / visible / greater interaction and involvement with the local community / be more in touch (7.2%).
- Look after locals / be more people focused / put people before commerce / put existing residents first (7.2%).
- More focus and concern about social issues liveability ambience (7.2%)

3.3 The important things for the City to do over the next 10-years

In the survey the last question before the "Tell us about yourself" section asked respondents to list the three most important things for the City to do over the next 10 years. This question was an open-ended question and did not provide a list of answers, allowing respondents to type in any items that they wished.

The most common themes were:

- Improving the safety of the area
- · More regular events and attractions and free community events
- Better public transport
- Improvements to traffic management
- Plant more trees and provide more shade
- Limit high rise development
- Support small business.

The relative frequency with which the survey participants mentioned things is shown in the table below:

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
3.4 Survey Sample Results

A sample of 567 interviews was achieved, comprising of the following connections with the City:

Residents	511 (90.1%)
Business owners	49 (7.4%)
Students studying in the City	40 (7.1%)
People working in the City	131 (23.1%)
Event attendees	442 (77.9%)
Shoppers	479 (84.4%)
Other connections	99 (17.4%)*

*Friends and family live in the City; children attend school in the City; members of clubs in the City; exercise or cycle through the City; come to the City to eat; and volunteer in the City.

The profile of the stakeholders who participated in the survey is shown in the figures below. The results have been analysed for each of these demographic and socio-economic groups and reported in the sections above to determine if they have specific needs in relation to the SCP.







Q12. What suburb do you live in? (n=567)

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



Figure 8 Age profile of the survey respondents




Figure 10 Representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in survey responses

Q15b. More about yourself: Do you have a disability or care for someone who does? (n-567)




Figure 12 Representation of City staff in survey responses

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4.0 FACE-TO-FACE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT RESULTS

4.1 Face-to-Face Community Workshop

The face-to-face community workshop was hosted at the City of South Perth Civic Centre on Wednesday 24 February 2021 between 6pm and 8.30pm. Thirty-one people from the City's community, action and advisory groups and volunteer base attended the event. When sent the invitation to attend, participants were asked to submit photos of the things they loved about South Perth. Several photographs were received and strongly reflected the river and green and open spaces.

The City's Manager of Stakeholder and Customer Relations opened the session with an explanation of what the Strategic Community Plan is and how it underpins all aspects of City planning. The focus of the workshop was community needs in 2031: participants were first asked to consider their own needs in ten years' time and subsequently encouraged to look beyond their own circumstances to consider the needs of others through the use of personas.

The personas used (see section 4.1.4) were developed by City staff and reflect the diversity of the residents in the City of South Perth. Six personas were developed, with two personas randomly selected for each table.

4.1.1 Outcomes

As in other face-to-face sessions, moving around the City was a key theme of the face-to-face community workshop. An interesting difference emerged in considering their own future needs and the needs of the personas used in the session. Public transport improvements were central in both scenarios, but there was *much* greater emphasis on community transport options.

Similarly, social supports and services assumed greater importance when considering other people's needs than when discussing their own future needs. Participants also highlighted the need for culturally appropriate services.

Notably, there was little discussion of safety.

4.1.2 What do you love about the City of South Perth that you want to retain in the next 10 years?



Q1. What do you love about the City of South Perth that you want to retain in the next 10 years? (n=44)

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Asked what they love about the City of South Perth and want to make sure the City retains, the top three themes were clearly evident, with each theme containing between nine and 13 ideas. People love:

- The City's identity and its icons, including its local neighbourhoods, the Ferry, the Zoo, the old theatres
- The beautiful environment, including its trees and streetscapes, parks and gardens, open spaces, river and wildlife
- *Events and activities,* including experiencing art and culture, being part of community clubs, going to bars and restaurants, attending markets and concerts and festivals.

Lesser themes were:

- Services and facilities, such as the recycling program and access to public toilets
- Other, which included a collection of ideas such as parking, schools, disability access and power (note that no context was provided for 'power').

4.1.3 South Perth Tomorrow

The first table exercise was an activity in two parts:

- (i) Participants were asked to think about a ten-year time frame from a personal perspective and consider how their needs and interests may have changed and what impacts those changes will have on what they want from and how they interact with the City of South Perth. They were asked to write those concepts on post-it notes, recording one concept on each note.
- (ii) The second part of the exercise was for participants to group those concepts into like themes.

The five tables submitted a total of 109 concepts; although they were categorised differently on each table (see Appendix 1), the themes were similar across the groups. Their responses were coded into categories used across the face-to-face stakeholder engagement exercises to make for easier comparison between stakeholder engagement activities.

The three largest themes were moving around, services and facilities, and events and activities.

Almost a third of concepts related to the theme of transport / moving around the city:

- Improvements to the bike and pedestrian environments accounted for almost half of these
 responses, including walking paths around the river, lighting, better/safer footpaths, pedestrian
 crossings, separate bike and pedestrian paths, more seating along paths, and end of trip parking
 facilities for bikes
- Public transport improvements accounted for a further ten responses, including local area transport including shuttle buses, more ferry services, more frequent buses, smaller buses, better connection points and a train station)
- Traffic management measures, including dropping speed limits and better traffic management generally.

Services and facilities emerged as the next largest theme, with almost 30 ideas submitted. These ideas were diverse and included:

- Health and wellness options
- Waste and recycling services
- Aged care, including accommodation and support
- 'Other', which included a range of services such as libraries, the local hospital and community safety.

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Events and activities comprise 16 ideas, including concerts, vibrant cafes, restaurants, cultural experiences, community clubs and family-friendly activities.

Lesser themes (attracting between two and six ideas) were:

- Development, including no more high-rise, infrastructure for an increasing population, large shopping centres, more housing choice (downsizing accommodation), open up closed cul-de-sacs and develop the Old Mill
- Nature and green spaces, including planting native plants, retaining the Canning River environment and great parks and public places
- Aboriginal culture, including signage and more Aboriginal stories and indigenous history shared / in public spaces
- Accessibility, including better accessibility generally and specifically for wheelchairs and an ageing
 population
- Leadership, which related to more transparency from Council
- Cultural diversity, including an increased focus on cultural diversity and more diversity in new arrivals to the City.

Additionally, there were a number of 'other' suggestions, including places for kids, more public art and enjoying being active.

4.1.4 Strategic Directions: Review of Priorities

The purpose of the second table exercise was to think about priorities for the future and consider whether the priorities identified in the last SCP were still meaningful. The exercise asked participants to look at other people's needs, with each table given two personas to consider. These personas were developed by the City and reflect the diversity of its community. Participants were initially asked to consider each persona's needs on the basis of a certain set of circumstances and once the table had exhausted all ideas, the table moderator revealed additional characteristics. Participants were challenged to consider how these additional characteristics changed each persona's needs.

Using different colour-coded post-it notes for each persona, participants were asked to consider their needs in the context of the City's Strategic Directions – Community, Economy, Environment (Built and Natural) and Leadership.

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Although the circumstances of each persona differed, there was overlap in terms of their needs.

Moving around was the dominant theme, with almost 50 transport-related ideas. The two main areas of focus in this theme were:

- · Easy to access, reliable public and community transport, and
- Improvements to the bike and pedestrian environments.

Other ideas in this theme included specialist transport, shuttle buses for late night events and clean energy transport options, better infrastructure for mobility scooters, accessible parking and parking for parents and bikes.

Ideas about services and facilities were the next most common. The range of ideas presented included:

- Access to health care (including in-home care, a one-stop shop for health services, respite services, mental health and men's health)
- Transport services

- Early childhood facilities, day-care and schools
- Facilities and services to support the elderly
- Culturally appropriate services
- Affordable and inclusive events, activities and recreational opportunities, including opportunities for intergenerational connections
- Community directories, to facilitate connections between people and connections between people and services

'What we noticed is that when you added the other considerations [such as a disability], the social support needs only increased.'

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4.1.5 What are your top three priorities for the City of South Perth now?



Q2. What are your top three priorities for the City of South Perth in now? (n=32)

A total of 95 responses were provided by 32 respondents.

Their top priorities were:

- Moving around which includes improvements to the bike and pedestrian environments, improvements to public transport and traffic management
- Services and Facilities including community services and facilities generally, swimming pools, volunteer services and libraries etc.

The next most often mentioned priorities were:

- Planning (9), includes better planning, maintaining liveability, planning for population
- Accessibility (8), inclusive spaces
- Nature and green spaces (8), including sustainability, open spaces, outdoor activities
- Development controls (7), relating to control over / no more high-rise development, and also
 includes managing density, maintaining building setback and affordable housing.

Raw data was sorted a second time into categories corresponding with the SCP Strategic Directions: Community, Economy, Environment (Built and Natural) and Leadership. Several ideas fell into multiple categories. For example, accessible transport options fits under the *leadership* strategic direction (with the City advocating for a train station and improved services), the *Community* strategic direction (helping connect people and enabling independence) and the *Environment (Built and Natural)* strategic direction (a safe and well-maintained bike and pedestrian network).

Strategic Direction: Community

- · Good, safe, affordable, local venues and events
- Community care and age-appropriate support activities
- Clubs and social opportunities (in person and online)
- Volunteering opportunities
- Modern food courts, bars, eateries including affordable options
- · Links with university support services, networks and clubs
- Grocery delivery services
- Activities including movies, bowling
- Visiting health care professionals
- · Community activities that run in the morning and the evening
- Another library in the North
- Free learning and activities spaces
- Cultural groups, including Aboriginal community group meetups

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- Intergenerational connections
- Outreach support for vulnerable people
- Community groups: mothers' groups, men's' groups cultural groups, senior citizens
- Respite services
- Safe communities /lower speed limits
- One-stop-shop for health and medical services

Strategic Direction: Economy

- Local entertainment including late-night bars, movies and restaurants and coffee shops, as well as family-friendly venues
- Subsidised services, discounted entertainment, financial support and cheaper rates
- Shopping opportunities, including bulk food
- · Job opportunities and internships, local employment and work from home opportunities
- Better technology to work from home
- Volunteering opportunities
- Affordable child care
- Housing choice
- Local coffee shops
- Family-friendly restaurants and cafes

Strategic Direction: Environment (Built and Natural)

- More street trees in Manning
- Modern child care services
- Shopping centres, including large central shopping, neighbourhood shopping and shopping centres built for click and collect
- Safe and well-maintained bike and pedestrian environment
- Easily accessible transport options
- Recreation including public gym equipment, better parks and recreation facilities for adults and children
- Community gardens
- Improved accessibility, including wheel chair access and audible traffic signals
- Central health care services
- Pick up and drop off bays on Canning Bridge
- Solar power
- Good road network

Strategic Direction: Leadership

- Advocate for improved, accessible public transport, bulk billing health centres, childcare centres and better public schools
- Be innovative and adaptable, transparent
- Funding for technology and services including Wi-Fi, libraries and a volunteer coordinator and satellite community hubs
- Communicate and connect, providing community directories for services and support network in the city
- Culturally appropriate services and multiple languages
- · Support services for migrants, men's health, disability services and health services generally,
- Development controls (no high rises)
- Sustainability, including clean energy and limits on house sizes
- Financial assistance with rates

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4.1.6 What are your top three priorities for the City of South Perth in 2031?



Q3. What are your top three priorities for the City of South Perth in 2031? (n=29)

A total of 79 responses were provided by 29 respondents when participants were asked to imagine themselves ten years into the future: what will their priorities be? The top three priorities for participants were:

- Community services and facilities (25 responses), including aged care services, the Recreation and Aquatic Facility (RAF) and creating community connections
- Transport (17 responses) emphasising bike and pedestrian environments, improvements in public and community transport and traffic management
- Nature and green spaces (14 responses), focusing on open spaces and environmental management.

Accessibility, Development Controls and Events and Activities were lesser priorities.

4.2 Business Breakfast Forum

The business breakfast forum was hosted on Thursday 4 March 2021 at the South Perth Community Hall and was run in partnership with the non-profit organisation Business Station. This activity capitalised on existing scheduled event to raise awareness of the SCP Review and canvas opinions from the business community.

The SCP engagement was allotted the final half hour of the session. The Manager of Stakeholder and Customer Relations introduced the group to the Strategic Community Plan, their role in its development, what to expect from this session and other ways to have their say.

Data was gathered via Mentimeter, with the City asking ten questions in a variety of formats including word clouds and multiple choice. Given the limited time available, this proved an effective means of capturing data although did not allow for discussion of the issues raised.

The City provided the consultants with the raw Mentimeter data. Submissions often contained multiple ideas which needed to be separated. Submissions were then categorised into like ideas, with those ideas then grouped into larger themes.

4.2.1 Outcomes

Most respondents appear optimistic about the future of their businesses in the City, with almost 70% expecting their business will still be located in the City of South Perth in 2031. That said, their responses suggest they perceive some challenges in the business environment. COVID-19 is viewed as a very real risk to business within the next two years. Other risks include rising costs, staff shortages and health, including mental health.

When asked questions about how to bring visitors to the City, how to encourage them to stay longer and spend more, three key themes became evident:

- Support for business in the form of advertising and promotions, including local advertising and
 promoting the City as a destination to draw people to the area
- Providing more for people to do when they are in the City (events and activities), and
- Moving around making it easier for people to travel to and around the City through better parking management, more public transport options and better infrastructure for pedestrians and cyclists.

They feel the City does have a role to play in providing support to businesses through:

- Facilitating connections and networking
- Advertising and promotion, both in terms of providing opportunities for businesses to advertise and promoting the City more broadly
- A range of other supports for businesses which include opportunities to learn and develop, assistance with costs and advocacy into Government.

4.2.2 What are three ways we can encourage visitors to the City?



Q1. What are three (3) ways we can encourage visitors to the City? (n=52)

A total of 139 ideas were submitted by 52 respondents.

Two themes dominated:

- Things to do
- Moving around (transport and parking).

Of these, providing more things to do accounted for almost half the suggestions made (65 submissions), the most common ideas among which were:

- · events generally or markets generally,
- bars and dining,
- tourism and
- to a lesser extent, dog-friendly places and spaces.

Transport issues was the next largest category. Improved public transport generally was a major theme in this category, with specific mentions of a train station, CAT bus and expanded ferry services. Other concepts included:

- Heavy vehicle restrictions and traffic calming measures and
- Active transport (bike and pedestrian access).

Parking attracted slightly fewer suggestions than transport issues. Almost half the ideas submitted in this category mentioned free parking specifically.

Lesser themes broadly related to supports for business and the business environment including:

- Advertising and promotion, which included better advertising of free events, promotional campaigns and activities, advertising outside the local area and a smart app
- Connections and networking, including running events and collaboration
- Other business supports such as retail hours, and a business centre of excellence.

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4.2.3 What are three ways you can encourage visitors to the City to spend more money at your business?



Q2. What are three (3) ways you can encourage visitors to the City to spend more money at your business? (n=35)

A total of 81 ideas were suggested, organised under the following themes:

- Business Support
- Moving Around
- Events and Activities
- Consultation and Engagement
- Development.

Half the ideas submitted broadly related to supports for business and the business environment

- Advertising and Promotion, included promoting local business, South Perth as a destination, social media marketing and assistance to advertise more broadly
- Connections and Networking, including business listings and directories, face-to-face events and work from home networks
- Signage / Street signage
- Collaboration with other business / with the City
- Other a collection including: spaces for businesses, reduced red tape, grants, more business focus, and referrals.


A quarter of submissions related to moving around the City of South Perth:

- *Parking, more than half the comments were about parking, with several mentioning free parking specifically*
- Transport included bike sharing, bike paths and public transport, and
- Signage / street signage, which included wayfinding.

Lesser themes included:

- Consultation and Engagement with comments fairly evenly divided between collaboration with the community and communication initiatives such as newsletters.
- Development included comments variously relating to aspects of City urban density and controls on developers.

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4.2.4 What are the top three ways we could make our City more attractive and encourage people to stay longer and visit more often.

Q3. What are the top three ways we could make our City more attractive and encourage people to stay longer and visit more often? (n=46)

This question invited people to vote for the **three** most important actions the City could take and a total of 46 respondents placed 138 votes. The three most important actions the City could take to make the City more attractive and encourage people to stay longer and visit more often are:

- More events (30 votes)
- Better managed parking availability (28 votes), and
- Encourage activation of areas through temporary businesses (19 votes).

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4.2.5 What are the top three (3) ways the City could work with you and further support local businesses?



Q4. What are the top three (3) ways the City could work with you and further support local businesses? (n=44)

44 respondents provided 88 suggestions.

More than half of the submissions (51) broadly related to providing more support for business, including:

- · Connections and networking, including a business directory and more workshops and events
- Advertising and promotion, including actively promoting local businesses and business events and free promotional opportunities
- Other business supports including business hubs, mentoring opportunities, opportunities to collaborate, advocacy and assistance with costs.

Other themes were

- Development, including spaces (shared spaces for offices, spaces for pop ups, and start-ups) and development / activation of local areas e.g. Angelo Street and affordable housing.
- Moving around, including free parking, traffic calming measures and more transport options.
- Consultation and engagement, including communication (easy ways to interact with the City's
 website and awareness of City offerings), surveys on a regular basis, listening and being a voice
 we can hear.
- Events and activities including dog friendly spaces, tourist attractions, activating empty spaces and more affordable public facilities for locals.
- 'Other,' which included continued economic improvement, attracting the right staff, and 'fewer words, more action'.

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4.2.6 What is the one greatest risk to your business within the next 2 years?



Q5. What is the one greatest risk to your business within the next 2 years? (n=46)

46 respondents each provided an answer and 17 perceived COVID-19 as the biggest risk to their business within the next two years. Other responses were fairly evenly divided among the following themes:

- Staff shortages
- Moving around, which related only to poor traffic management
- Disruption/business resilience, including not remaining adaptable, technology changes, stagnation and e-commerce
- Economic downturn
- Costs, including rising costs, cash flow and rent.

Other risks mentioned were poor health, and government over-reach and legislation.

4.2.7 How do you think you can further grow your business?



Q6. How do you think you could further grow your business? (n=43)

46 respondents made 78 submissions.

Suggestions relating to supports dominated, accounting for more than half of all suggestions made. Responses in this category were fairly evenly divided between:

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- Advertising and promotion, including using social media, South Perth business directory, sponsorship opportunities, support local events and destination marketing
- Other business supports, including business development strategies, access to advice, collaborate with other businesses, support local providers, enabling change and business incubation
- Connections and networking, including referrals, increased social media networking, more events like this, business introductions and information, closed Facebook group for City of South Perth businesses.

Lesser themes were:

- Events and activities, including local markets and more events generally
- Transport, including improved traffic management on Mends Street, improved ferry and rail services and improved road infrastructure and one mention of parking
- Collaboration, with strip shops / collaboration with similar businesses
- Consultation and engagement, including community involvement generally and one mention of Council representatives on Mends Street
- Government and legislation, referring to opening hours and red tape reduction
- Other, including health, planning and winning lotto.

4.2.8 What are some of the other risks you think there might be for your business within the next two years?



Q7. What are some of the other risks you think there might be for your business within the next 2 years? (n=44)

44 respondents provided 95 responses.

Responses to this question were diverse. Of the responses given, competition was highlighted by 23 respondents. Notably, competition was not mentioned at all as a risk at Q.5 (What is the one greatest risk to your business within the next 2 years?) but it emerged as the most frequently mentioned 'other' risk at Q7 (What are some of the other risks you think there might be for your business within the next two years?).

• *Competition,* including competition generally, increased competition, on-line competition and new competitors in the market.

Other themes attracting between five and eleven submissions were:

- Costs, including high costs / low margins, rent and rates, cash flow and low-price expectations
- Economy, meaning the economy generally, reduced public spending and lack of money


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- Health, including health generally and mental health specifically
- Disruption / business resilience, including ability to adapt, a changing industry, confidence, giving up/negative thinking
- Staff including staff shortages, keeping staff, finding good staff and skilled staff
- *Development*, including population stagnation, housing shortage, lack of infrastructure and shopping centres.

Less-frequently mentioned themes were:

- Other business supports, including funding, need for training and development and a local focus
- Collaboration, meaning a lack of collaboration
- COVID-19, meaning the associated travel or social restrictions
- Government and legislation, including political instability, the State Government, lack of leadership and lack of support
- Other, including public transport and road access, more customers, scammers, taking risks.

4.2.9 In ten years' time, do you see your business being in the City of South Perth?



Q8. In 10 years' time, do you see your business being in the City of South Perth? (n=47)

The majority of respondents (68.1%) felt their businesses would still be located in the City of South Perth in 2031.

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4.2.10 If you could wave your magic wand, what is the one thing you could change to help your business in 10 years' time



Q9. If you could wave your magic wand, what is the one thing you could change to help your business in 10 years' time? (n=49)

Respondents gave diverse responses, with the three most common themes all attracting between seven and eight suggestions:

- Government and legislation, of which four comments related to red tape reduction, three pertained to government support / the State Government's attitude and one about Stamp Duty
- Business supports, with half the suggestions related to advertising and promotion and the remainder relating to funding /grants and subsidies
- Costs, with reduced rent and rates key ideas.

Lesser themes were:

- Development, including internet speed and developing Angelo Street
- Health
- More customers, including more customers generally, better footfall and more people active.

Other ideas included two comments relating to disruption/business resilience, with the remainder including investing in staff, access to South Perth, location, high schools, lotto and karma.

4.2.11 What is the one thing that you think the City could do to help the economy in the City of South Perth by 2031?



Q10. If you think about 10 years' time, what is the one thing that you think the City could do to help the economy in the City of South Perth by 2031?? (n=47)

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The top four themes attracted between seven and ten responses each.

- Development, including infrastructure, developing local areas / hubs, increased development and increased population
- Other business supports, including attracting business / great retail / internationals to the area, employ local businesses, collaborate with businesses and a business hub
- Events and activities, including investing in events, providing more events and dog friendly places/spaces
- *Moving around,* including road access, a train station, more transport options plus two mentions of parking.

Themes with fewer than five submissions were:

- Consultation and engagement, including engagement generally, community spirit and 'tell us their plan'
- Costs, including rates and lower overheads
- Advertising and promotion, referring to the spend local campaign
- Government and legislation, including pushback against state government and red tape reduction
- Tourism, meaning attracting more people and supporting the zoo.

4.3 Youth Movie Night

A Youth Movie Night was held at South Perth Community Hall on Friday 5 March 2021 between 5.00pm and 8.00pm. The consultation was allotted a forty-minute period at the beginning of the session.

A total of 86 people attended. The core group of attendees were members of SPYN, a group of young people familiar with the City and comfortable engaging. Other groups of young people from local boarding colleges also attended the session. Unfortunately, many of these students did not bring a smart device with them and their responses could not be captured through the session.

The session relied heavily on gathering data through Mentimeter using a variety of question formats. Some supplementary information was gathered through brief conversations with individuals. This information has been included in the analysis. The City reviewed the raw data from Mentimeter, removing the inappropriate or irrelevant responses before providing it to the consultants for coding and theming.

Outcomes

This session demonstrated that young people still have ambitions of travelling. Family is important to them, as are cultural experiences and sustainability principles. Asking about future transport options generated enthusiastic responses. Many picture transport options as essentially the same but 'better' – improved safety and speed with less of an environmental footprint.

4.3.1 What do you see yourself doing in ten years' time?



Q1. What do you see yourself doing in ten years? (n=36)

Of the 36 responses, 21 were relevant. 'Working' accounted for two-thirds of these, with some specific ambitions identified, including teaching, being a rural doctor, a vet and Insta-famous.

A smaller number pictured themselves travelling, studying or living with / starting a family.

4.3.2 Ten years from now, where would you like to be living?



Q2. Ten years from now, where would you like to be living? (n=40)

Of the useful responses, a majority pictured themselves living 'elsewhere' or overseas.

- Smaller numbers envisaged themselves living:
 - In rural WA e.g. Calingiri or Broome
 - o In Perth, or
 - o With family
 - o There was one oddly specific reference to Canberra!

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4.3.3 Why do you want to live there?



Q.3 Why do you want to live there? (n=42)

Being somewhere fun and different was a key theme of the responses, with several making specific reference to experiencing a different culture.

Smaller numbers made reference to:

- Beautiful parks and scenery
- Being away from others
- Being part of the community
- Working.

One was very specific about her values and purpose in moving to a rural community.

'I want to be a doctor in a rural area and form meaningful connections with the communities in rural towns.'

4.3.4 What would keep you in the City of South Perth?



Q4. What would keep you in the City of South Perth?(n=39)

Of responses received, the three strongest themes were

- Family and friends, including the community
- Entertainment and events, including events generally, nightclubs bars and museums
- The river and nature, including cycling paths along the river and the peaceful location.

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Lesser themes were:

- Nothing, responses driven either by a desire to get away or to go back to their home towns.
- Food
- School.

Ideas in the 'other' category included feeling safe, it being nice, having a good trash system, local culture. Comments gathered from participants by City staff and the consultants included:

'More places that are cool along the foreshore.'

'Having easier ways to get into the City and Uni without a car.'

'If I got a job.'

'Nothing would keep me here. You can't drive a tractor anywhere, you can't plant anything, you can't spray, you can't harvest, you can't farm.'

'If I could afford to buy a house here, I'd stay. The houses are pretty nice, especially near the river.''

4.3.5 What one thing would you change in the City of South Perth over the next 10 years?



Q5. What one thing would you change in the City of South Perth over the next 10 years? (n=44)

More than half of all responses were filtered from the data set. The remaining responses are diverse, with no strongly consistent themes. Ideas suggested at least twice were:

- Free parking or transport
- Greener and more eco-friendly
- More to do (markets and a museum)
- Tidier / less trash.

Single ideas included:

- Basketball courts
- Library
- Less crime /safer
- Liveability
- Less of a socio-economic divide, and
- COVID-19.

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Ideas gathered from conversation with participants through the course of the session reinforced some of the ideas raised above.

'Crime is pretty bad here. There are lots of break-ins.'

'Plant lots more trees.'

4.3.6 What concerns do you have for the future?



Q6. What concerns do you have for the future? (n=39)

After filtering out the inappropriate responses, two key themes became evident. Young people said they were concerned about:

- Climate change
- The economy/not being able to get a job.

The collection of 'other' responses referred to 'being stuck in South Perth', 'seeing my Dad', 'the younger generation' and 'Covid, mainly.'


4.3.7 How often do you walk to places in your local area?

More than half of all respondents are walking places in their local area at least weekly, with almost a quarter either never or rarely walk.


4.3.8 How often do you cycle to go places in your local area?

Almost two-thirds of respondents either rarely or never cycle for transport in their local area. Just over a third are cycling at least monthly.


4.3.9 How often do you use the bus to go places in your local area?

Just over a third of respondents either never or rarely use the bus to travel in their local area. Given that many of the participants were young students from the boarding schools, their opportunity to travel by bus may be limited and their answers may not be typical of young people living with their families the City of South Perth.

The majority of young people either never or rarely use the train for transport in the local area. Given that many of those attending the session were young students from the boarding schools, their responses may not reflect those of the wider population.

Fewer than a fifth of young people skate as a form of transport.

There were no other forms of transport and so there were no votes for this session.

4.3.14 What type of things would make it easier for you to get to places without a car?



Q14. What type of things would make it easier for you to get to places without a car ?(n=33)

Most commonly, participants suggested improvements to the pedestrian and bike environments, including the availability of hire bikes and designated off-road bike paths. Next most often mentioned were:

- Flying, including flying cars, hoverboards and planes, and
- Improved public transport, including simpler bus routes and buses that run on time.

Other suggestions included driverless vehicles, horses and time-travel.

4.3.15 How do you think travel will change by 2031?



Q15. How do you think travel will change by 2031 (n=39)

This question appeared to capture participants' imaginations. Several respondents replied in full sentences, providing insightful verbatim quotes (see below). The most common theme was:

Improved vehicles, most often, electric vehicles with smaller numbers suggesting driverless vehicles and better cars generally. Some of the responses provided the motivation behind their suggestion: climate change and sustainability.

'That we travel in a more eco-friendly and sustainable way to reduce the carbon going into the environment.'

'I will drive my car more, but hopefully it will be a car that is eco-friendly \oslash '

Less common themes were:

- Flying, including flying cars and other personal flying devices
- Travel will be more efficient, including being quicker and safer.

'Flying cars will control the sky.'

'Everyone will be able to fly with special devices.'

A small number thought travel will be the same. A collection of 'other' responses included:

- Public transport will be better (high speed rail)
- Conveyor belts for transporting people
- Teleportation
- Travel will be socially distanced.

'You will have individual booths to stay in on the planes.'

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4.3.16 Other feedback

Other feedback from participants gathered by either City staff or the consultants included ideas on the following topics:

- Public transport
 - Make the ferries free
 - Have a counter that tracks how much carbon emissions people are saving when they take the ferry or bus
 - o A free bus that does a loop of South Perth locations
 - Need the buses to run more often and go more places
 - o Share vehicles like bikes and scooters.
- Sustainability
 - Improved waste and recycling services
 - Electric vehicles and bio fuels.

4.4 Online Community Workshop

The City of South Perth hosted an online workshop for members of the community. The purpose of this session was to provide the community with another way to be involved in the consultation. Participants were recruited on an opt-in basis. The session was facilitated by the City of South Perth's Manager of Stakeholder and Customer Relations.

The session was attended by a total of ten residents, with six people joining remotely from their homes. The remaining four preferred to meet face-to-face at the City of South Perth and join the online group via Zoom from there. The City adapted the workshop format to accommodate this, providing a second moderator to help facilitate the face-to-face session. Difficulties with the microphone meant this group could not contribute to the main discussion and essentially ran a parallel session.

The online workshop employed similar activities to the face-to-face workshop and asked people to consider their own future needs as well as the needs of others. The exercise asking participants to consider their own future needs was simplified to remove the grouping task, and the exercise reviewing priorities was simplified to accommodate the online environment, with fewer personas used. The session used a Mural board, an online engagement tool, to allow participants to post virtual post-it notes.

Outcomes

Outcomes from the online workshop were similar to those from face-to-face community. A key difference was the emergence of sustainability as a major theme in both the exercise examining future needs (South Perth Tomorrow) and in the final exercise, examining participants' top three priorities.

Leadership also emerged as an unprompted theme early in the stakeholder engagement, with participants actively seeking a more proactive, innovative, bigger-thinking local government.

4.4.1 What people love about the City of South Perth

- Access to the city
- The parks, gardens and the beautiful environment
- The potential of the area
- The zoo
- South Perth is for people
- Diversity
- Age of the area/character
- Growing an inner -city vibe.

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4.4.2 South Perth tomorrow

Many of the ideas submitted through this activity focussed on bigger- picture concepts.

- Control increased density
- Contributing to regional aims such as curbing urban sprawl.
- More community engagement
- Leading the way as a council
- How can we think more region-wide
- Thinking more of the future
- Encourage new employment
- Accessibility
- Better transport around the City
- Sustainability
- Improved public transport
- More green space.

Once categorised, they fit neatly within the existing SCP strategic directions; some fit into more than one strategic direction.

4.5 South Perth 2031: Reviewing priorities

This activity asked participants to consider the needs of others. It used two personas: Dave and Diane. Participants in the online group identified similar needs for the personas to their counterparts in the faceto-face community workshop, with transport and social services and connections particularly important.





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

Q4. What else do you think could help us achieve our aspiration of a diverse, connected, safe and engaged community?

1. Retain the public open green space, and views of the river and city which are unique to South Perth. 2. Do not promote high-rise but instead promote smaller blocks to facilitate green title terrace homes, which ultimately are more COVID safe. This will assist with street parking as each residence will have carparking facilities, unlike many of the unit high-rise developments which are being currently passed that have no car bays attached to the unit, or some having only one car bay. We are a City of cars. We drive cars as are railway system does not enable us to travel to all suburbs and within those suburbs. Without car bays attached to unit developments on site - being a minimum of two car bays per unit, there is congestion for street carparking. 3. Cafes should be open past 3pm and the neighbourhood hubs then become a bit dead. They should be encouraged to be open for longer. Al fresco - use of areas adjacent to businesses should be encouraged with planter boxes, colourful umbrellas - doesn't have to be a cafe, could be another style of business. hold more events for the community

I find it hard to support many of these as they imply big expenditure of our rates to achieve them. e.g. it is questionable that rates should be used on a 'range of community events'. or to 'foster local growth'. We do not need more growth especially paid for by rate revenue.

I am a student at Penrhos College and I am a Karajarri girl from Broome and I think we need to do more activities and events on indigenous history as not much people are aware of the past. I believe that traffic congestion has got worse over the last few years. peaceful roads are now very

busy. (Hensman Street) parking of residences on the road leads to a traffic hazard (Anstey Street). This is a huge safety aspect the speed of cars all roads should be 50km as more people are riding bikes, walking and running. The traffic is a danger to those people. (All around South Perth community) People are travelling on other roads and not the main roads- Coode, Labouchere and Angelo- people rat among the small suburban streets to avoid traffic lights, etc.

I feel like South Perth is heading in a good direction overall, except for the area of safety/crime, which seems to be getting worse. Better links with the police and possibly CCTV might be helpful. I think new developments will help creating a little City Centre with unique/new shops (not the usual retail shops you find everywhere in AU, not matter what shopping Centre you visit) and facilities local residents can use and enjoy.

I think that you have ALREADY ACHIEVED THAT.....it is simply a matter of CONSERVING IT and doing gradual upgrades to EXISTING INFRASTRUCTURE and PARKS and the like.

I think the Mends Street precinct is so small it would lose its community if overdeveloped. I think there are enough high-rises in this small area as infrastructure is starting to struggle.

I think the sense of village centres (Mends St, Angelo St etc) is very important. It is where local people are able to have casual contact which gives that sense you are in a community. As urban infill picks up pace this could be easily lost - as could the amenity provided by the proximity to the CBD and the river with the increased population. And of course, SP is a magnet to other Perth residents because of the river and parks. Managing the traffic through disincentives to use cars, improving walkability, dare I say light rail (??) and other such strategies will be increasingly important. Please also don't forget places for kids - they and their parents add vibrancy to the community.

I think too much expenditure on concerts, don't necessarily benefit residents. Consider only community events at a local scale. Stop posting the Peninsular magazine to residents. I think you are doing a great job

Improve facilities - particularly recreational i.e. the RAF swimming pool.

Improve the streetscapes of South Perth by fast-tracking the underground power program and then having a coordinated approach to verge tree selection so we have canopy trees / boulevards. Plant trees in centre lane of Mill Point road and/or refuge islands.

Improved local transport

Improved public transport, i.e. extend the ferry service. Have buses connect with the ferries. Light should be explored for some of our more travelled routes. A transport interchange or hub. In order to ensure the City is connected and safe there does need to be more focus on keeping through traffic on major roads and off the local streets. Diversity comes naturally from having a

Jobs available

Just a small observation: I don't think the previous question was very useful from a community consultation perspective. There's plenty of things my family (and I suspect many others) would have ranked higher than the available choices. The City should be very cautious about placing too much weight on community responses, where those possible responses have been limited to a small number of pre-determined options. The City should prioritise its resources according to need. Community safety is a fundamental need that should be prioritised, particularly in areas that are experiencing relatively high levels of anti-social activity (such as Karawara, Manning and areas of South Perth). CCTV, public lighting, elimination of "dead spaces", ranger services, and advocacy for reduction in social housing in over-represented areas (Karawara again) should be the focus.

Keep as much open space OPEN. Along the Swan River - keep it as our Australian bush - let our families enjoy the wide-open space, to run and play - our backyards no long can do this. Support local communities endeavouring to revegetate and making corridors of green throughout City. Very impressed with the corridor being done by the Kensington Bush initiative - it backs on to Dept of Agriculture land -be very careful developing this land, starting prioritising the bandicoots, the birds over household cats, make a park for the dogs to run, but dogs should at all other times be on a leash - be strong and decisive on these issues so residents know where they stand

Keep green spaces, focus through traffic

Keeping things like markets, more things for neighbourhoods

Kick out the drug dealing Homeswest residents

Leadership from Council to reflect engagement with community - not only at elections. Increased funding for community safety. Greater presence of Elected members and City staff in community. Leave open spaces alone. There is constant talk of some sort of development on these open spaces. Less dense living in fill in Mill Point

Less high-rise and more sustainable developments

Less high-rise development If development is necessary, more low-rise (3 stories or less) which is more spread out

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Less high-rise development we are becoming a concrete jungle with no soul.

Less high-rise developments

Like to see more recreational facilities, retain the public open space, greater open space between high-rise developments which could be used for public community use, more understanding between residents and administration.

Limit high-rise buildings to one area. Makes the future ghetto easier to control. Limit on street parking by enforcing residents to use bays provided on their properties. Some streets are impossible to traverse. Ban on verge parking near intersections that limit the view of oncoming traffic. Being legal does not make it right. Traffic speed control is drastically needed on the lower half of Hensman Street, two large size speed humps would solve the escalating problem before a pre-schooler is killed there.

Limit high-rise in Como

Limit the development of high-rise residential and business properties. The heart and soul is being taken out of South Perth with these developments

Lots of \$ spent on the foreshore areas, need to focus on the suburban 'middle' too. Too high% of community housing near Curtin Uni.

Love attending community events - especially concerts at Sir James Mitchell Park Low-rise not high-rise

Maintaining the nature, parks, lakes (artificial and man-made) and wildlife. Reduce high-rise development. Increase seating around the parkland and water and wildlife areas.

Make all suburbs equal, i.e. South Perth, Karawara, Manning, Waterford, Como.

Make sure you don't take away the things which we already have like the Cygnet movie Theatre as the community likes to attend social activities locally. Encourage local businesses to remember not everyone in South Perth is a millionaire or tourist and not be greedy with prices, i.e. local hotels. Put permanent cameras on Mill Point Rd peninsula end to stop hooning before someone gets hurt and cameras on the traffic lights at Mill Point and freeway to stop them driving off at high speed without being spotted. Have less street parking on the Esplanade both sides and more free elsewhere to avoid danger to pedestrians. Have more food trucks, stalls and pop up bars along the foreshore in the summer to encourage visitors from all diverse groups not pander to local hotel greed.

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Medium density rather than high-rises.

Mende street is a great location to meet, eat, drink and shop but is spoiled by the volume of vehicle traffic that move through at speed. Many cars do not give way to pedestrians at the crossing. Please consider making mend street vehicle free.

Mends St needs to be made more of a precinct and better facilities

Minority group events e.g. showcasing different cultures etc to promote acceptance

More alfresco seating at r Foreshore with happy hour drinks

More bus service not less to all areas

More cafes and local parks

More city funded programs

More community consultation re planning and a fairer system giving ratepayers more say and a right of appeal

More community events

More community events - inclusion of people with disabilities and faith backgrounds

More community events and gathering

More community events for young people making use of McDougall Park

More community events that are accessible

More community support and facilities e.g. recreational centres

More crime controls. More population growth incentives

More cultural events to share diversity More police presence to ensure community safety Limit new apartment approvals - too much growth too quickly without infrastructure to support it

More diverse membership on council - representing community interests and not business interests - with genuine residency of the area and not just a business or leased property footprint. Seek more community input on ideas, proposed developments etc

More education to problem youth

More efforts to reduce crime in hot spots e.g. reduce Homewest where in high concentrations. Demolish old Homewest units/homes and sell land to private owners. Use the funds to build new Homeswest in OTHER PARTS OF THE METRO area. Carefully screen all new Homeswest tenants and avoid 'dumping' toxic families in South Perth. More integration between school groups and aged care facilities as the elderly have so much to teach the young people. Not all young people have grandparents, and this helps them to gain respect for their elders. In time, it would be wonderful to see young people helping the elderly and added to the safe and connected culture of the City of South Perth. This could be implemented via a community service program.

More market and local community stalls. Hold markets at a primary school.

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More open transparent decision-making process and giving time for community response with planning of new projects / initiatives. Community events that are inclusive, affordable community events and incentives / benefits for residents

More park recreational activities for use by residents. table tennis, skate board, BMX track for young children, water playgrounds. this would be great to be integrated within park areas. Parks don't only require barbeques and shade shelters, but also recreational activities for all ages. Another could be tables made to look like chessboards so all ages of the community could participate and meet the community residents within the recreational open space. Cafe single storey lifestyle facility. Not upmarket restaurants but a place to have a coffee within the recreational park areas offering facilities.

More patrols in manning. Our cars get broken into every second week, which is becoming very expensive.

More people using Travelsmart means such as bikes, e-bikes, walking for outdoor connections and engagements in a safe way. The erection of well-designed and written environmentally and historically educational interpretation signs on the foreshores (c.f. Shelley foreshore) More police

More police

More police and neighbourhood watch patrols. Better lighting for night-time in Neil McDougall Park. Various cultural and different age community-based groups to engage residents.

More Police patrols to prevent cars being broken into when parked on a street, and thus providing a stronger feeling of safety; More acknowledgement of where South Perth has come from - please do not destroy the houses from 1920's onwards as they are a visual connection to our history and evidence that we are not a new suburb, but one with history and strong community;

More police presence

More policing of people who don't leash their dogs up and those who don't pick their dogs poo Required policing and realising seeding cyclist and those who don't give way to walkers - should charge them with attempted manslaughter. Some think they have the right of way over pedestrians on footpaths and others think the footpath or road is a velodrome.

More public access areas that encourage shared lives between low, middle and upper socioeconomic groups. Address the elitism that exists and anti-social community attitudes around poverty or diverse communities.

More public events; businesses opening later

More resident activities i.e. expand men's sheds to central South Perth. A community garden for CoSP residents? Ernest Johnson area on Sandgate Street. More shade and toilets on foreshore and Ernest Johnson near to playground for toddlers. No more multiple single level building

developments like Ernest Johnson which has been a disaster for shade (wrong orientation) toilet facilities not near playgrounds and poor economic decision.

More residential street safety patrols to deter criminals. Get public (Homeswest) houses down to an average number, not extremely high like they are at the moment.

More security

More security cameras in parks etc to improve safety for residents, especially the older residents More security interventions. e.g. the town of Victoria park has a rebate system for citizens who install security screens / cameras in their house.

More security measures such as lighting. A police station would be good, how about reopening the historical one at Mends Street?

More spacious and congenial areas for both mingling and contemplation, mixed in/connected with the housing. The streetscape in Mends St is bitty and charmless. Angelo Street is more like it, in partly because of the borrowed vista of Wesley green space. The proposed treatment of Preston Street is a lost opportunity with no visionary urban design. I am wary of phrases like 'activate the street'. If the adjoining development had been well thought out from inception the street would activate itself once the project had been completed. People would just gravitate to it.

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More support for community led projects and initiatives, more innovation less of the same/clinical/vanilla approach, consider the needs/wants of every demographic group More thought out into allowing multi story apartment buildings that don't have adequate parking. The issue of cars parking on verges should have been considered

More traffic calming in residential streets to stop speeding and dangerous driving

More Whadjuk Noongar culture and flying the Aboriginal flag next to the Australian flag. Signage in Whadjuk next to the English words like the City of Albany has done. More public toilets that are open 24 hours as the only available one is tucked away near the Narrows Bridge and I feel unsafe using it early in the mornings when I'm out running.

Not doing well on item 5. Example: Mends Street Piazza. There was an opportunity to integrate the beautiful old gazebo but this was trashed in favour of giant metal lizards.

Nothing else - keep doing what you're doing

Nothing, keep it as it is.

Open spaces, free /cheap parking around local parks Shade for all. More street lamps and a security presence A city wide composting program to compliment the mulch program.

Opportunities for community engagement of all groups

People are worried about security. Having a presence here brings problems. I don't know if they have cameras around here or not near the foreshore. Having a Constants here, bringing people here, using the foreshore for outdoor events.

People who live in South Perth regardless of the side of Douglas Ave should have the choice to send their kids to either Como or Kent street. We all pay South Perth taxes so should have the same benefits. Wesley is great but it good to support public schools.

Place activation

Plant more trees along the streets - make the City of South Perth a green suburb like Applecross, Cottesloe, etc

Plant more trees, fix up all footpaths and cycle paths, and create more shade to lower the heat foot print.

Plant more trees, protect current green spaces. Stop building ugly high-rises. Protect historical land marks. Improve safety.

Please don't put too much emphasis on aboriginal history and culture. For example, naming the Mends Street Piazza Mindeerup was such a bad idea. It adds no value and no one knows what or where it is.

Preserve the nature, flora and fauna, the calm, serene, tranquil, picturesque ambiance which is unique to South Perth Peninsula.

Prioritising access and safety for pedestrians and cyclists. E.g. traffic calming measures on Mill Point Rd, widening pathways where pedestrians are forced to walk very close aside fast-moving traffic.

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Close Mends St to traffic, stretching from Windsor to Cocos and turn it into an area where people can walk and dine without the intrusion of cars. Not only would this improve an already great atmosphere, it would provide greater scope to host community events, musicians etc, and make it an even better and safer social hub. It would set a great example for other urban areas to demonstrate the atmosphere that can be generated when vehicles are removed from cafe and shopping areas.

Proactively review traffic flow in the area including provision of walk signals on major traffic lightcontrolled thoroughfares

Probably provide more parking.

Progress

Promote diverse economic opportunities - shops, restaurants, activities

Promote local commerce, sensible density increases and improved facilities around popular hubs. The City is dead after dark.

Propose what is diversity, connection, safety and engagement to general public

Protect heritage in the City (provide a grant toward protecting heritage houses - \$5k a year)

Protecting and utilising local spaces for community events. More rangers/police to help educate and enforce respect for the local amenities, while encouraging their use. Perhaps more ferries going from Mends Street to "On the Point", East Perth, Fremantle and so on.

Protection of green spaces, the interests of the many moreover the interest of a few wealthy home owners and business people. Trees before property views

Provide facilities that cater to more diverse community groups, not just the traditional sports and activities. Consult more widely, listen to the community feedback. Most public feedback is dismissed.

Provide more / new green outdoor spaces plant lots more trees as street trees to enhance shade for walking in the City promote development of open community via avoiding high density, creating local street parks / green spaces and reducing traffic in local streets people like parks and use them to connect, recreate, exercise, socialise

Provide more activities for teenage kids - all sports etc at George Burnett cease at age 12.

Put all overhead power lines and poles below ground

Rail station for the zoo

Redesign the piazza by adding more greenery, maybe a fountain that has a cooling effect, shade (currently a heat sink) and shelter (bring back something like the pavilion that was removed during the piazza development). Few seats with shade and nowhere to shelter from rain other than to stand between the legs of the numbat and lizard.

Reduce public housing density in Manning

Regular data collection of who lives in the City of South Perth - both homeowners and renters. Not just favouring those who've bought into the area.

Remove Homeswest density, we live in fear every day. Rename Karawara to Waterford.

Reply to emails sent voicing concerns by residents. A greener South Perth.

Restore village atmosphere

Safety- Reduce speed on Douglas avenue (river side of highway) because vehicles speed up and down. More speed signs as people believe the speed limit is 60kms. Diverse - I believe the community is very diverse, engaged and connected - allowing residents to ad improvements to their properties to secure their properties such as garages, carports etc. More event, offers and opportunities to win decent prizes

Safety could be achieved by better pedestrian and cycle access. Cars in the area don't slow down or give way to pedestrians

Safety is paramount to the health and wellbeing of our citizens. We need to ensure there are mechanisms to translate people's concerns with actual tangible actions. I want to see more

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information about what the council is doing to addressing hooning in well recognised locations, robberies/theft for example in Karawara. I want to see clear messages about what progress is being made on these issues. Also, I'd like advice on methods and activities I can do to help undertake these aspirations as well, for example, by promoting volunteer opportunities or networks, where uptake by community can be measured.

Safety patrol teams

Safety should always be the priority. Visitors and residents must feel safe. Use technology such as smart security cameras and slow down traffic. Find regular activities for residents such as a Saturday organic market.

Safety through improved lighting where appropriate.

Safety would be a big one, I have a home that is very secure however we are regularly getting attempted break ins on Angelo St. it's like we don't have police in the area ever. Security

Seek and use relevant and honest and balanced data from which to make plans and decisions about future directions

Serious traffic management

Shade, shade, shade on the South Perth Foreshore between the Narrows Bridge and Mindeerup Plaza. As per the CLP's vision of 'a city of active places and beautiful spaces. The plaza is a beautiful addition to the foreshore and it is utilised by a lot of people every day, however they cannot linger for long during sunny days (which is most of the year) as there is insufficient shade around the seating areas. The longer people linger, the more they are likely to spend money in the businesses in the area. For locals like me and many tourists who visit the area, we have one of the most spectacular views towards Perth City anywhere in the world, yet again there is absolutely no shade on the grassed area towards the Narrows Bridge. Again, an opportunity for people to spend time there and to spend their money in the local businesses. It would also encourage more people from our community to spend time with family and friends there.

Should use Sir James Mitchell Park more frequently for events such as a paddy market during summer or autumn months, possibly 3 times over a period of time near the flagpole where there is plenty of parking

Small hubs that draw the neighbourhood together, not necessarily people form miles away.

Smaller, niche, community events like indigenous languages, art/craft workshops, recreation like dance etc

Social events/ Concerts

Social sports on the many grass areas. Very cheap and easy to run, great for community. Free parking everywhere (or at least 3hours free). This encourages people to look around. Also, better lights on the pedestrian path between boat shed and the ferry. It is underutilized due to darkness once the sun rises later.

Some security cameras on quieter streets such as Roberts street and Thelma street. There have been many car break-ins over the past couple years

something that engages the community and brings them together. I believe our society is distant and should come together and intertwine.

South Perth market once a month where local artists have space to create and showcase their work South Perth needs to embrace apartment living, as it will clearly be the key area for that kind of living. So, you need to encourage social amenities like cinemas, a small neighbourhood theatre, art galleries, gyms, a wide variety of shopping and restaurants.

Spend more for and the benefit of the rate paying residents that live here and stop being so focussed on business that make money by the council continually spending ratepayer's money on them.

Sports, aquatic and fitness centre. Business networking. Job seeker training

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Steps to deal with traffic safety - hoons on Mill Point Rd, speeding cars on Preston Street (causing regular vehicle damage to cars parked on the street) Steps to improve amenity e.g. serious need for shade at new foreshore development. Extensive investment in activities to build connections within the community and fight loneliness. Maybe more street parties, community/verge gardening plus supported social activities would help.

Stop all high-rise developments. Agree on a medium height limit and enforce it.

Stop building high-rise as it is ruining the feel of the community

Stop building high-rise buildings and go back to open spaces.

STOP building, keep green spaces, FREE PARKING to encourage shopping and dining and activity Stop overdevelopment and unsuitable development Preserve views, parkland and garden aspects Stop the goons from roaring up and down the street in their cars. They just rip up the place just because they have fancy cars. Up men's street specifically.

Stop the social engineering. Where are you trying to go with "Diverse?"

Strategy to deal with ant-social behaviour.

Street festival, upgrading access over freeway and facilities at Como beach, rejuvenate beach and build swim jetty. Ferry at Como jetty. Enticing rooftop dinning to capture amazing views that the City has from many locations.

Street safety, larger all-day market, hawkers' market. Boardwalk nightlife along South Perth foreshore More eco electric buses. Handicap plus normal pedestrian access to the canning bridge train station from the southern side of bridge over station 2 x lifts and 2x stairs platform extends past bridge, people(kids) are always running late for trains and crossing 3 lanes of traffic is not ideal. Freer events music. Compulsory Solar panels on all new building approvals residential and commercial. More trees. More community involvement in strategies for the City going forward. Homes for the homeless.

Support and encourage public housing, and low-cost, diverse, long term housing. Provide scholarships and educational grants for disadvantaged students. Support Community Visitors Scheme participation at all local aged care facilities. Facilitate kindergarten visits to aged care homes. Subsidise childcare/kindergarten costs for single and low-income families. Support and encourage local artists and artisanal manufacturing with grants, subsidies and provision of workspaces. Similarly provide support for co-operative enterprises. Establish bilingual names for all public places and facilities in English and Noongar. Cease funding Australia Day activities. Rename all public places and streets named for colonists connected with genocide and other crimes. Turn the golf parks into garden allotments allocated by priority for disadvantaged apartment households. Pedestrianize Mends Street. Provide a local shuttle service to the shops. Provide extensive cycling infrastructure across the City. Lobby to implement a congestion and pollution charge on Kwinana freeway and the causeway. Switch to organic pest management of city lands. Rebuild wetlands along the foreshore. Close the jet ski zone.

Support for grass roots organisations. Better communications to the constituents on decision making. Stronger engagement with police (petty crimes seem to be rising).

Support local businesses. Many small businesses shut down in last 8 months.

Supporting businesses run by Indigenous and People of Colour and CaLD communities; increasing public art spending or encouraging land developers to donate 1-2% of contract values into City of Perth for arts investment instead of more building awnings

Swimming pool

Swimming Pool and a major activity centre

The City of South Perth identity and amenity severely needs to change. Reinforcement should not be encouraged under any circumstances.

The City of South Perth through its Community Rangers, in close liaison with the WA Police, must more proactively deter, mitigate and curtail the current epidemic of burglaries, malicious damage and theft from cars and homes, and of other suspicious activity occurring within the City of South

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Perth. I and other City of South Perth live in fear and with dread about the likely possibility of our cars being damaged or stolen, or our homes being broken into and burgled by these criminals that are currently running amok.

The community has a very good brand, a strong mayor. It needs to be more environment friendly. The Council should not go outside its accepted purpose

The split paths for cyclists and walkers have been a huge step forward, as well as the good lighting all the way along these paths. Maintaining this will be an ongoing positive.

The thing I value most about living in the community of South Perth is connection to the natural environment - living and engaging with natural environment - protecting, maintaining and enhancing natural environment. I actually felt very limited in above priorities that not only could I not put that first - and that it wasn't there at all. For me community and natural environment have a very strong connection.

The word "diverse" is used in the City's aspirations, yet there is no mention of supporting greater inclusion of our Aboriginal history and culture. The City of Melbourne is leading the nation with its acknowledgement and inclusiveness of our Indigenous history. It would be great to see the City of South Perth commit to diversity, not just have it as an aspiration.

These are all nice statements but there is a real lack of focus on 'getting back to basics' for the actual rate paying residents that live in our city's local streets. Repairing broken street lights, regularly pruning street trees without constant requests so people can walk safely, maintaining paths. These are the things that should be done FIRST, then the other ideas follow after. Not enough budget or day-to-day resourcing is focused on our City's every day needs first and this disproportionate focus continues to widen.

They should build a pedestrian crossing at the road area across from the ferry.

This is a difficult one, I guess one thing is the City is not used as a dumping ground for socially challenged people. The ideals often backfire on the social planners as such it requires support from state and federal government or will lead to social issues which have a negative consequence. This might be an unpopular view but the best way to achieve our aspiration is by supporting further medium and high-density development which will attract more residents and businesses to the City and allow the council to further develop community facilities e.g. a public swimming pool, a tree lined cafe strip in either Manning or Salter Point e.g. like Ardross Street, Applecross and attract more businesses to area. You only have to look at anti-development councils like the City of Fremantle and to a lesser extent the City of Perth (Northbridge) and Subiaco to understand how communities can start to degrade.

To be in the times, I still feel South Perth is a bit dated, need more vibrancy in the area. Some areas are still quite dark and not properly lit. The speed humps on Angelo near the shops aren't painted NOT safe. A good shopping hub, free parking to get people in, more parking, to make it an inviting place to be in. We don't want what has happened to Subiaco.

To encourage greater ENGAGEMENT consider creating a (frequently updated) register of volunteer activities that could be carried out by individuals/community that would add to the four above-listed community values

To set up these surveys to offer real choices. To provide clear communication, without meaningless, undefined parameters. To explain what the City actually means by the vague categories above. To demonstrate the intended outcomes of the nebulous terminology above.

Too much petty burglary - need find a way to manage this

Traffic management on Mill Point Road near Narrows Bridge to stop the terrifying hooning. Train station at South Perth

Underground power in Kensington. Less restrictions on verge use (i.e. allow tree swings, cubbies in trees, and vegetable gardens on verges).

Underground Power to all suburbs. Keeping the Community informed of Plans for South Perth. Underground powerlines

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Understanding and preparation of infrastructure to accommodate the immediate (known) population infill which is above natural growth, across various socio-economic groups and ages. Unfortunately, South Perth has no plan of what it is trying to accomplish other than adding more population density in an effort to achieve "vibrancy". South Perth use to be able to identify itself as a "Village" unique and different than Perth CBD. However now it is headed down a path which will associate it with being only an extension of Perth CBD: high density, congestion and numerous highrises. People departing on the ferry from Perth CBD will not expect they are visiting a "Village" at South Perth but merely an extension of the sprawling Perth CBD.

Upgrades to public facilities

We are happy where we live apart from the issues pointed out above. When we purchase our home in Waterford there was no Aircraft noise and this is what we wanted to get away from. The foreshore of Canning River was to be cleaned up and all the unapproved plantation that the City of South Perth planted without authority from the Swan River Trust. That has not happened and Complained about for years now. I would like to get an indication as to when this will happen please.

Working with state government to reduce the excessive percentage of social housing in Karawara. You assume that I agree with this statement and to an extent I do. I believe the City needs to stand up for itself and its ideals and not be bullied by State Gov or developers and their lobbyists to turn the City into just another concrete jungle which is well on the way. The City needs to maintain its unique character that should be protected - most people admire South Perth for being a green city, with lots of beautiful tree lines streets, parks, spaces and the only City Zoo in a garden.

Your absolute #1 priority should be the reduction in state housing. Followed be an increase in private built environment investment

Address the lack of a neighbourhood hub in Kensington. We want one!

An outdoor cinema in summer, a swimming area like Brisbane's South Bank, again, more culture. Noongar walking tours along the Derbal Yerrigan for example- South Perth is an important landmark and place of significance for Whadjuk people....a great story about Yagan could be told.

Angelo Street is underutilised. More smaller events e.g. WASO concert. You spend too much money on Aus-day, and this doesn't give a good enough return. Could build in some pergolas that can be booked cheaply for small events, similar to Kings Park.

Arts film festival at the Cygnet?

Better access to Melville water (for swimming, kayaks, paddle boards and other small recreational craft) which forms a large border of South Perth but is difficult to access due to the presence of the freeway. There is one existing launching facility however it is devoted to jet ski use only.

Better connect with the NGOs who are working in the area. Improve state schooling- too big of a social divide between the numerous catholic / private options and state offerings.

better planning and development with canning river. underutilised, great to exercise around but facility for residents i.e. cafe, restaurant or bar. redevelop the tennis, bowling, soccer, rowing and scout clubbing into one modern building with a private cafe/bar open to public.

Better public transport from Waterford

Better shopping facilities around South Perth

Better traffic flow, more off-street parking.

Better transport links

Better urban design in new build.

Better use of the river parks area like south bank in Brisbane.

Better use of the South Perth foreshore/waterfront, unlike the draft Perth Water Precinct Plan which would keep the status quo and not utilise the City's biggest asset to its full potential.

Boardwalk and nightlife along South Perth foreshore, make aperture want to long South! Ongoing free activities for 12 to 25-year-olds. Free access to the zoo for over 60s

Bring commerce and activities onto the streets, like market towns; make al fresco much easier to do with fewer restrictive rules and hurdles.

Build community boat storage facilities to support resident use of the Canning River.

Building a wall along the freeway to increase safety for residents -Shelter from the sun along the foreshore from narrows to Mends St -playground at grassed area opposite the old mill

By listening to the people who live here. I think closing down some of the Karawara Greenways is a mistake. Once closed opportunity lost. Install more camera's and spot lights to keep out offending behaviour - with a bit of innovation the place could become a cycle haven. South Perth is known for its gardens. By supporting more local events and local talent

Capitalise on the City's location. It is in the almost geographic centre of metropolitan area bridging north to the south, east to west.

Carefully s consider develops and how they fit with the area/climate - e.g. the hot concrete wasteland at Mends Street - too hot to be used in the summer months

Cater for pedestrians more than vehicles, by improving foot paths. Ensuring construction sites do not impede pedestrian access. Not much fun crossing and re-crossing footpaths to reach your objective. Cheaper tip fees

City should provide stand-alone CoSP museum in a prominent area. It has boxes and boxes of treasures in their archives that people have been donating for close to100 years that have never been seen

Collect the rubbish and maintain the roads. That is your job. Concentrate on that.

Decrease tourism.

Definitely Not that cultural centre at Sir James Mitchell Park. Pop up activities along the river parks would be more appealing.

Develop local cafe/restaurant hubs with better traffic management. Work with neighbouring Cities/Towns to develop shared facilities.

Development is frowned upon in South Perth (see Dan Murphy's, Farmer Jack's, South Perth Activity Centre, Preston Street Revival etc for recent examples). This attitude needs to change, the City is nowhere near thriving right now. Rather than caving in to a minority of residents the majority of the time, the City needs courage and good leadership to push forward, the community not only demands it, but needs it, despite what the vocal minority might indicate.

Encourage more businesses into the City like those in Leederville, Mt Lawley and North Perth

Public and community art. Parks are not just for sports!! Focus on local activity centres' needs rather than establishing new centres (such as RAF). Provide ample accessible parking at economic centres (vs wining laneways of Waterford Plaza, Dan Murphy, Farmer Jacks) that squeeze regulation parking bays around a facility. Communicate what is meant by 'activation'. Seems to result in glass walls of offices/rooms or empty shopfronts.

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Focus on what's best for the people who actually live here. "Quality of life" in the greedy profiteering credo of big business and developers. Help local businesses and services that are beneficial to the community and support the local community.

For our major shopping areas to be more people friendly.

Foster input and engagement with younger people on things of interest to their age bracket. develop these. Encourage developments and fight hard against entrenched, aged resistance to ANY development or idea with no rationale apart from just not wanting anything to change. Seek out innovation and new ideas - don't just wait for them to be presented into the City.

Have lots of community events and have different groups of people run it. Like mini communities- I.e. disabilities.

Have more employment for the people who live in city of South Perth.

Have more food trucks, stalls and pop up bars and family events along the foreshore in the summer to encourage visitors from all diverse groups not pander to local hotel greed. Utilize local bowling clubs to be more accessible to the wider community.

Have the ferry service at extra points along the fore shore to major attractions.

Help local businesses first. This is for all things!!

Help local cafes to become night time providers of food. Transport between hubs needs smaller buses for people to move around without using cars. Reduce the high-rise buildings to boutique apartments only 5-storeys not 25-storeys!

High profile entertainers in concert Improvements to the theatre and more diverse programme of events

Hold more events and encourage new developments

How about building a music bowl like Myer Music Bowl in Melbourne on the under-utilised James Mitchell park near King Edward St. The City backdrop will provide a second-to-none vista and the naturally sloping ground is ideally suited to tiered seating. With such a venue, the attractions will take care of themselves.

I find to do many things I need to leave my city. I put this down to the NIMBY attitude in many areas. I find it interesting but I am meant to support innovation attractions and opportunities. These are fantastic but are often centred toward the northern end of the City. I find it ironic that my council has put parking meters into this area to discourage people from going there. Are we heading towards Fremantle Victoria Park and Subiaco trends

I like having the food trucks down at the foreshore.

I like the food trucks that are hosted at the foreshore every weekend, it is very engaging with the local community members and is a great communal area. The food is very good and also the live music, it is a great way to have a relaxing afternoon.

I love seeing people and families using the parks. I hate seeing the constant flow of rubbish left by some groups blowing towards the river. Aside from that, we have some of the best open spaces in

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Perth and some of the best weather in the country. These combined set us up for the ability to host events for most of the year.

I think one of the dangers in attracting other people to the City for events etc, is the continual parking problem and restrictions for locals who live and shop here all the time.

I think South Perth need a brand - something we are known for then plan around that. We are on the water so maybe focus on the underutilised foreshore areas and all the opportunities associated with that. The big South Perth Sound concerts are spectacular!

I think the tourism side will take care of itself - Mindeerup is a great success as an attractant and we have the natural attractions of the zoo and the foreshore areas. I think the concentration should be on providing residents with reasons to get out and about - markets, sporting events, walkable areas and reasons to walk/places to walk to rather than drive. I do think the separation of cyclists and pedestrians MUST continue - the two are as bad a mixture as cars and cyclists.

I think we could do with more things for kids to do but also more history

I think we should keep up the things such as the South Perth food vans on the foreshore and we need more things like that that bring the community all together. More things such as farmers markets more things that bring us all together.

I would be interested to learn of the achievements in these regards over previous Strategic Plan, has there been any areas of great success that would be benefit from further focus - and which were not so successful but remain a listed priority that could be redirected or assisted. Ranked 1 - Community Hub has much been bandied as a priority to identify needs, match volunteers etc. Needs professional management min. \$100k p.a. therefore, substantial funding necessary- need for funding then becomes priority. Ranked 2 - Refer above Ranked 3 - Coach Bays that allow coach loads of tourists to park up and allow 40+ tourists to alight, wander, spend time in local businesses. Coach companies have an amazing network, generous well-placed coach bay locations are passed around very quickly and will bring the coaches. Events would be second priority as these are one off by nature, activating 7 day per week attractions will bring continual visitors.

implementing initiatives to deliver the identified priorities. little has changed in the last 3-4 years other than growth in development. the same issues remain

Improve commercial hubs and high streets.

Improve facilities - particularly recreational i.e. the RAF swimming pool.

Improve facilities such as public toilets, more bike paths, footpaths

Improve fee parking in the area

Improve safety. Nobody is attracted to area if their cars and houses get broken into all the time. Improve transportation, parking.... Trail map?

Improved CYCLE-WAYS, FOOT PATHS and ROAD VERGES......to improve ROAD-SAFETY....especially near SCHOOLS.

Increase housing density

Increase involvement/ opportunities for inclusion in events such as Fringe Festival and PIAF at places like The Old Mill Theatre, The Old Mill, Cygnet Cinema, Mends Street, CoSP Community Hall, Angelo Street, Waterford. To help bring 'tourists' into the area to help support local food outlets and provide a variety of entertainment genres. In doing this, arrangements need to be considered for residents wanting to access events as parking is minimal and sometimes might be too far to walk from homes. Increased diverse population, will bring people with new innovative ideas. Fast track applications. Increased population density

Increased public transport systems, particularly in the evenings and weekends. It is difficult to travel around by public transport at these times due to the low frequency of bus services; also, the lack of bus services to meet the trains at Canning Bridge station

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Innovation and opportunities in sustainability and environment like Town of Vincent and Town of Victoria Park. We have an officer, Julia, and she actions nothing of consequence. Plant more trees (native - marris)

Intentional community building programs - bus stop libraries, community gardens, public resources like swimming pools and parks, street parties, reducing the number of short stay Air BNB /booking.com type of properties by encouraging long term residency (discourage short term residency).

Invest in a first-class boating marina, utilise Sir James Mitchell Park instead of lawnmowing contractors South Perth train station needed

Involvement of community from different stages of life / groups, having competitions to come up with creative / innovative ideas to improve the City

It would be good if we could take advantage of free talks at Curtin Uni. Perhaps the Astronomy Night at Curtin Uni could be advertised in the City's Peninsula? We could make attractions of our bushlands by managing them to encourage orchids and a diversity of plants along pathways. Also lobby to manage pest bird's species. Also manage non-local trees in bushlands. Employ aboriginal people to assist in bushland management and to escort tour groups.

Keep current identity and high-rise development marginal and non-encroaching in existing residential areas. High-rise on old commercial/business areas

KEEP THE FEELING OF A SMALL TOWN AND CHARM RATHER THAN BENDING TOWARDS MORE AND MORE LOST SMALL BUSINESSES BENG ABSORBED INTO LARGER SHOPPING AREAS... LIKE THAT ON MENDS STREET IN THE NEW HIGHRISE ON THE CORNER.

Leave it alone for a while to allow what has already been done settle into the community

Less focus on Mends St/Foreshore and more investment to the other neglected areas of our city like Manning and Waterford.

less high-density apartments, bring in more environmental and sustainability opportunities and services e.g. food waste, plastic recycling

Less ticketed parking

Less time allowed between demolition of existing buildings and construction of new ones - the derelict space becomes dangerous and ugly. More Fringe and Festival events in the City of South Perth

Like the recent developments on the South Perth foreshore, similar things could be done at Waterford/Salter Point foreshore. Ideal area would be near the Curtin Rowing Club/Scout Hall at the end of Elderfield Road. A cafe, sitting areas, lights along the river etc would be great.

Low level, locally focussed amenities and events

Make it easier for business with less red tape

Make sure all mixed-use development utilises a highly adaptable and robust ground floor. It should be free of structural walls and must not be geared to larger tenancies, rather ultimate flexibility, where any size of tenancy can be created from only a few large tenancies through to many many small tenancies. Enable fine grain shop fronts, improve alfresco opportunities, supress vehicle impacts on social areas. Improve dedicated bicycle network, including infringements for parking over dedicated cycle path shoulders.

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Make the application for building improvements easier

Make the City of South Perth safer at all hours of the day or night. Safe cities thrive. A safer City of South Perth would cause its residents to feel more at ease and be able to focus more on the opportunities that are presented by the City of South Perth. The current attractions are likely to be patronised more if residents feel that their home is safe. Some residents are refusing to leave their homes because of the risk of being burgled.

Many parts of the existing City commercial streets have tenancies for lease. The City continues to require more ground floor commercial/retail to 'activate' our streets when there is little to no market, or in locations such as Mill Point Road near the Freeway where there is limited pedestrian traffic. The City would be best placed to provide support in targeted locations such as Angelo Street, Preston Street, Ley St where the community and local business will benefit. One off general events and attractions may be nice for City staff to organise but have little long-term benefit. Providing long requested development opportunities on the foreshore with good, serviced, accessible, leasable sites for cafe/restaurants, bike/scooter hire etc etc, would all create ongoing activity. Housing the Old Tram on Mill Point Road is nice in theory but does nothing to provide real economic benefit against the cost incurred. That cost-benefit analysis, particularly benefit for genuinely local people in Manning, Como etc isn't evident.

Maybe more events along our foreshore and Zoo.

Minimalise structures that encourage and enable individuals to live anonymously. The community is failing many ppl who barely noticed lockdown nor CoVid-19 because their lives were already isolated. Monthly or weekly open markets in Angelo and Mends Streets

More activities and events planned, facilitate local groups running their own events in local spaces, fund the arts and offer in-kind support for groups to use the City's spaces to create and share, don't focus events only on families but also young working professionals.

More advertisements. Fun free events for families

More alfresco dining in fitting with the theme of South Perth. The foot paths to be renewed most of them are a disgraceful; public toilets at Richardson Park and the foreshore.

More art sculptures

More bike hires and live music

More coffee vouchers. Less high-rise, more terrace homes, more space for development. Maintaining the green open spaces of South Perth, that's what makes it unique here.

More open community spaces that allow for community events Greater diversity in commercial areas More pop-up cafes / markets along the river in different sections

More regular "one off" family events on parklands which allow people to gather and enjoy the location.

More regular ferry services

More spaces like the South Perth library, which has been a great artistic hub that has made me feel very connected to the community for years

Not too sure really, definitely keeping up city of South Perth's engagement in new innovative ideas and activities like the RAC bus that runs on the foreshore. More job opportunities would be good for local residents who are older or with disabilities.

Nothing to add

Once again, I don't think the previous question was very useful from a community consultation perspective. The City's "Buy Local, Shop Local" campaign and recent focus on supporting local business is a great initiative and should be commended. I'm cautious about the options in the above question, though. Local governments shouldn't try to do the work the private sector can do. The City should focus on making the district an attractive and convenient place to do business. Achieve this by: * providing adequate public parking (either free or sufficiently inexpensive so as not to deter

commerce); * facilitating a Town Planning Scheme that encourages development; * adopting an efficient and customer-friendly service culture; * minimising red tape (and green tape); and * ensuring an efficient and convenient transportation network.

One of the things I love most about the City of South Perth in terms of attractions and opportunities relates to things like the Manning Farmers' Market and the food vans at the foreshore. It was also great to see that pop-up bar a few years ago (Embargo Bar). I'm looking forward to seeing the development of the arcade at the Welwyn Avenue shops as this is my favourite small shopping village. I would like to see the Cygnet Theatre given more of a higher profile or promotion as it is a rich part of our history and I feel it is undervalued and underutilized.

Open air cinema with screen on river barge. More parking near Mends Street

Outdoor concerts on foreshore, bring back the embargo bar, volleyball nets on beach, market stalls in car park. Water obstacle and pontoons with slides on river during summer.

Parking areas surrounding the open space parkland with recreational facilities for families to be free parking to encourage people to use them. Attractions should be limited to local events as the City of

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South Perth is a residential area and residents are entitled to privacy, peaceful surroundings and not to be encumbered with congestion of traffic caused by large events/attractions.

Partner with local community groups

People naturally migrate to natural green environments. CoSP development consistently doesn't follow through on the green aspects of community spaces... Manning Hub phase 1 and now Phase 2! People will shop locally if their needs are met with services, businesses, accessible parking and competitive prices. For e.g. the Preston St IGA is always busy because it offers and excellent range and quality as well as being comparable in pricing with larger chains.

Place a heavy focus on environmental initiatives, possibly turning them into attractions. Embrace artificial intelligence to make South Perth a smart city. Include attractions for teens to encourage activity and social interaction. Some incredible initiatives are happening around the world and South Perth could act as an example to other cities by utilising some of these initiatives. A great source of ideas exists on Instagram page @get.wast.ed - this is a very credible, well run information service that any council should be aware of.

Plant more tall trees to provide more shade against the sun.

Plant more trees along the walking paths around the river.

Plant more trees to create shade areas and create more nice places to rest, play and enjoy.

Pop up events and vendors without compromising the park front and river front

Pop up markets, rent relief as an incentive for vacant commercial buildings to be leased

Proactively use the foreshore for events. Work with swan river trust to build more facilities on the foreshore

Progress the sport and recreation centre proposed for Collier Park

Promote local community events.

Protecting the amenity of the area

Provide a family activity, family housing, development via small blocks, promoting terrace homes Provide a raised stage near the Mends St Jetty - powered and with some overhead shelter - for bands to perform, outdoor theatrical plays etc. This could foster an expansion of the arts. Push for the South Perth railway station

Fush for the South Fertil railway

Rail station for zoo

Recognise the value of having character homes in the area. The constant demolition of these homes to utilise the land for developers' greed is not going to help the area in any way. If anything, the golden triangle of developments of high-risers will in time rise the population in all the wards. Then perhaps the train station and a ferry operating from Preston Street will be part of the future going forward.

Revitalise under used council facilities such as the old Manning Library - what is planned for this? River ferry extended.

River focused activities. Recreational and rehabilitation.

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Sadly, South Perth is becoming just another high-rise city no different that Perth CBD or any other typical high-rise, high density city around the world. Tourists are looking for something that is unique not similar to every other city. South Perth could have achieved that but there was no plan. Take a look at Coronado Island in Southern California, USA in a similar geographical location as South Perth across from San Diego. The plan there is to stay low-rise and as for tourism in 2018 \$14m was contributed to the City from tourism.

Same as above. More events to attract people

Singapore uses food to bring people together, specifically hawker centres. The Esplanade (between the Narrows Bridge and Mends St jetty) would be a great location for a big hawker centre with seating overlooking the river with city views. Would engage the Asian community and attract visitors to the Mends Street area.

Spend money where needed.

Stop asking meaningless, ambiguous Qs. Describe the City's intentions and options for each of these possibilities.

STOP building, keep green spaces, FREE PARKING to encourage shopping and dining and activity

Stop developing the town centre

Stop posting the Peninsular magazine to residents, rather spend money on facilities i.e. play grounds, bike paths etc.

Stop wasting money on attractions. Spend it on planting trees to cool, shade and create beautiful spaces where people and nature can connect.

Strategic planning and creating events

Street festival, upgrading access over freeway and facilities at Como beach, rejuvenate beach and build swim jetty. Ferry at Como jetty. Enticing rooftop dinning to capture amazing views that the City has from many locations.

street markets, close off road outside of the Windsor at night and have food venues on the road

Stronger marketing support for local artists and events.

Support a network of neighbourhood hubs

Support and enable innovative micro businesses (i.e. Streets food trucks)

Support artists through locality-based production grants. Support artisanal manufacturing by offering rent subsidies for new businesses. Provide financial support and space for co-operative enterprises through rent subsidies, priority purchasing from the City, and creating a co-op hub. Garden allotments allocated by priority for disadvantaged households. Create local exchange markets for backyard gardeners, artists, and artisans. Pedestrianise Mends Street. Provide extensive cycling infrastructure linked with access to public transport e.g. lock and leave facilities at the ferry.

Support businesses that focus on innovation

Support learning and senior citizen centres. they are vital to the City. Provide residents with a booklet for all hubs in the City. (a city-wide calendar of events/activities available) similar to the waste collection booklet/magnet

Support local businesses

Support local businesses that have struggled in the last year. Need to have community facilities for all age groups and diverse activities.

Support local employers to maintain and expand their 'businesses' including the provision of suitable parking. e.g. South Perth Hospital needs the carpark to continue providing excellent local health services and substantial local employment.

Support more arts and music, film nights. Create a 'sewing shed'. Like a men's shed for women. Support Perth zoo more with infrastructure e.g. parking and local events linking zoo with local community

Support start ups

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Support the building of the Recreation and Aquatic Facility at Collier Park. This project alone will activate, innovate and create opportunities for all areas that were identified in 2017 for the CoSP economy.

Supporting the reduction of car use, by perhaps buses that loop around the City, to bring residents to shopping areas, study areas, the river and access to the City via either Canning Bridge train station or the ferry.

The above cover this initiative

The City could support the Zoo in far more ways than it does, there was a missed opportunity in the ACP to incentivise commercial enterprises that complement the environmental aspects and sustainable employment

The City has lots of small businesses peppered throughout the community in small, local neighbourhood shops. Would be good for these places to get more visibility to enable patronage by local community instead of heading to larger shopping centres outside of city

The City of South Perth needs to ensure that residents' lifestyle, privacy and Street parking within the City is not impeded by events and attractions to grow tourism. City of South Perth is a residential area, where aged people live, families live and children go to school. It is not the CBD where people only go to work and leave in the evening wherein, events held in a CBD or night-time activities in the area does not impede residential lifestyle.

The concept of innovation isn't clear here. I think that ensuring people's fundamental needs are met is a necessity but that could be done in an innovative way. I think opportunities that strengthen the community is important, even as simple as ways to meet our neighbours. Or there could be a history, walking trail that is created like the one in Mossman Park.

The CoSP Council seems very conservative, unable to embrace the innovations and opportunities that will revitalise under-utilised commercial areas, for example refusal to support the Preston Street Revival, and inability to contribute meaningfully to Canning Highway renewal and the South Perth railway station (among other potential innovations). The Council needs to re-invent itself and adopt a more progressive, forward looking mindset.

The food trucks on the foreshore bring people together

The old library in Manning is still sitting unused, why not demolish it and turn it into park area, why wasn't this thought about prior to building the new library? Poor planning

The parking on the end of Coode Street oval is good, and good that it can be dismantled and used as an oval also, rather than bare hot tarmac. Support the existing character of the region. Don't overdo the growth.

The Windsor is great; however, competition should be allowed. Reducing red tape for small businesses would encourage innovation, attract business, create jobs, and lead to a vibrant community. Fix the east side of Mends Street. I understand private sector investment is required. Plant some fast-growing gums in the open spaces along the foreshore e.g. Sir David Mitchell Park and near the lakes by Coode Street. Not enough shade.

There needs to be balance of preserving nature and environment for sustainability whilst achieving aspirations of a thriving city activated by innovation etc.

There's always something going on. They've put the steel animals in. There's nothing really to improve.

These options are not helpful. Some of these are not wanted at all

To attract more people into the Mends Street Precinct, extending free parking to the first 2 hours. Events that are conducted for the community should be promoted more, as quite a few of them have had little interest from locals.

To be able to use our wonderful foreshore with more cafes eateries along the foreshore that creates income and gets people coming to South Perth as buzzing go to place, but would need the infrastructure (parking). Look at how popular the food trucks and Acai trucks are? Also incorporate a children's play pen area, the number of parents who are so busy on phones not knowing where the children are??

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To be prudent in spending rate payer money

Town teams, social enterprise, social innovation, volunteering opportunities

Unclear why Council should pay for 'events and attractions to grow tourism'. This should be a State and private funded initiative.

Unfortunately, South Perth streets are used to quickly flow traffic from the freeway to and from south eastern suburbs. The vehicle volume and noise levels create a negative feeling in an otherwise perfect location

Unless anti-social behaviour can be eliminated none of the aspirations will be realized.

Unsure

Upgrade riverside at Como beach and run ferries

Upgrade Welwyn Shopping Centre including the car park and landscaping.

Use blank walls for community engagement - to participate in the painting or design, have more sculptures along the foreshore and around South Perth for family's and adults to view and read about the historical areas within South Perth. Have a MENDS STREET FESTIVAL - close off the top of Mill Point Rd entering onto Mends St, and the bottom end of Mends St (the Esplanade). This would need to be when the weather is nice, and taking into consideration, parking - maybe utilise the Zoo carparks and surrounding areas, or encourage the public to use public transport with a discount connected to it.

Use events and attractions

Use indigenous art and history to create and indigenous sense of place and tourist attraction. Promote multiculturalism through events

Utilisation of the wide spaces along the river. Create and offer interesting events and attractions that can entice people to the area for a wider ranging activity other than exercise. Local history walks Strong indigenous presence regarding history and culture - the ongoing importance of the area. Utilise spaces in good planning - high density closes to Perth City with large commercial shopping, but as moving further south decrease the density forming smaller community hubs including scale of shopping. Retain the open spaces on the river frontages for all to enjoy and treed parks and gardens for walking exercise with dogs etc. within each community hub. Make sure developments have open space gardens with trees around the buildings and adequate parking so streets are not blocked and movement of traffic is clear and easy. Around the City Centre area create Performance/Concert Centre for Attractions of Ballet, Music of Bands/Orchestra/Choirs, Drama/Plays etc. for all the Communities to enjoy.

Utilise the foreshore area a bit. Build a water park for the kids...but not a typical WA water park. Check out the one in Cairns. Amazing

Utilize the smaller community areas in order to encourage more innovation. Tourism will naturally occur due to the City's proximity to Perth and the rivers.

Vocab above is jargon just concentrate on people friendly

Water playground on river. More cafes and activation of foreshore area - pop up bars and pop up food venues.

We need a swimming pool on the corner near the mills. They have some sort of wetland there. If we have a swimming pool, tourists will want to tour around Perth to this area. Adds to South Perth's amenities, which will help tourists come. We don't have many good swimming pools in Perth.

We need an interpretive centre on the foreshore near Mindeerup, the ferry, the Zoo to show our long history along the Derbarl Yerrigan, through to European colonisation and to the present. It could include history of flora and fauna in the South Perth region.

We need more security camera to catch the crime and stop the sneaking crime behaviour. Weather friendly venues - more shaded, undercover areas.

West of Canning Hwy there's lots of small food shops - Coles, IGA, Good Grocer - they're all small. Local residents have to pay more. There's huge population growth in these areas and there needs to be at least two large supermarkets. The limited shopping creates extra cross-suburban traffic. Smaller

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shops need a major drawcard. Lost opportunity in Preston Street where the proposed supermarket on the Cygnet Theatre development site was restricted to 1200 sqm, the minimum size for a full line food supermarket e.g. Coles or Woolworths is 3600 sqm. In Japan I've seen where they build over railways. Regarding South Perth Train Station - the government should sell the 'air rights' above the station to private enterprise to fund the railway station and allow the developer to build a major mixed retail, commercial, hotel, residential building bridging over the Kwinana Freeway and proposed station. This would also have the benefit of opening up the Swan River on the other side to the local community. Whilst events and attractions are nice, they come at a high cost to ratepayers and I question the value for money. Instead the City needs to support more regular activities for its residents and businesses. Whilst I don't have a business in the City of South Perth and I am not a retailer I would actively discourage the council to support events that include Food Trucks which are to the detriment to the food businesses that trade in the City throughout the year. I also think the same think should be said about framers' markets that come in on one day a week and take the trade of local businesses. In order to achieve a thriving community, we need to support local businesses (not chains) and make it easier for businesses to establish (less regulation) that will retain and attract more people to the City. With more people working from home, decluttering their lives and renovating, it would be cool to have extra kerbside collections. It's an inclusive service that all residents can benefit in some way from.

Youth engagement activities / attractions to reduce antisocial behaviour

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Q8. What else do you think could help us achieve our aspiration of sustainable urban neighbourhoods?

1. Bike path network to be expanded (discouragement of car use - providing alternatives) 2. Adoption of 3 bin system (which I understand the City has foregone already) 3. Extensive waste wise community engagement - it seems very few people really understand what should and shouldn't go in both their bins and most are unaware of the recycling centre. 4. Could the recycling centre be used as a central point for teracycle recycling, so that the recycling of various waste streams is maximised? 5. Could property boundary setbacks be relaxed to encourage parking on site, rather than on streets? 6. City to work closely with community Facebook groups which promote sustainable living, so non-Facebook members can be made aware of events.

1.City too easily dismisses sitting residents wishes against new arrivals- we see that in City granting and altering heights for new homes in areas facing the river- Mend Street, Salter Point parade etc A free bus service which is promoted so people know pick up points and drop off points to shopping areas, and parklands.

A link to the rail system

Abandon the Recreation and Aquatic Facility. We can't afford the: - cost to ratepayers - water - loss of vegetation, trees, bird habitat

Actively encourage residents to walk, use public transport and ride their bikes to locations within the City. Those doing so could acquire rewards when the phone app registers their movements on public transport or their attendance to specific locations such as the Perth zoo or the walkways at Sir James Mitchell park. Sustainable urban neighbourhoods are more likely to occur if they are not re-developed but, rather, renovated.

Additional cycle ways

Additional focus on the river environment would be appreciated. On a recent trip to Como Jetty the fishing line bin was overflowing.

Adopt environmental principles like the City of Victoria Park and Vincent do. Employ more people who are passionate about the environment and who act on the recommendations.

All of the above are priority 1 as all are integrated

All of the above promote this aspiration

Allow artificial turf (without approval) to reduce water use and harmful chemicals.

Allowing residents to ad improvements to their properties to secure their properties such as garages, carports etc.

Along the Melville Parade verge adjacent to Kwinana Freeway in the Richardson Street and Stone Street precincts, being the entry into South Perth, should be landscaped perhaps with feature Norfolk pines, white gum or river gum trees etc. Many houses are being replaced with new, often small, lot housing where the previous established trees are being removed and minimum likelihood of them being replaced. Perhaps some sort of building design bonuses could be adopted where vegetation is retained.

Already losing our unique character due to high density without convenient infrastructure such as a train station Transport issue Toilets foreshore and Ernest Johnson needed

An urban community garden, farmers market, more bike paths to encourage people to ride. A bridge that connects to Elizabeth Quay for walkers, all weather walkways especially from the ferry to the zoo.

Appropriate species of trees and shrubs to be planted in appropriate areas. Avoid planting trees that screen residents' views of the waterways and parklands. Avoid planting trees that become very high in residential areas where they eventually pose a safety hazard and shower outdoor living areas with leaves and other debris and block winter sun and solar panels.

As mentioned above, create a vibrant foreshore with eateries, music, benches, playpens, charging stations,

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Awareness of unique environment

Ban fake lawn Green waste bins as well as general and recycling Plant more trees for shade, wildlife and oxygen

Be a "Smart growth" city, encourage the urban village environment, reduce car dependency. Encourage and educate on the value of density and mixed-use developments, that will support thriving and vibrant hubs throughout South Perth, where people can simultaneously live, work and play. Such plans as the activity centre plan are the catalyst for this, providing the plan is acted upon in a timely fashion, without lengthy delays to applications.

Being mindful of the growth of all the high-density development in the area and study the impact of this on our water/ waste/pollution / cutting down greenery. Consider Fogo system like other neighbouring councils such as Melville.

Being sustainable

Better activation of spaces already in CoSP. Examples being - George Burnett Park: Criterium bike track? Enhance skate park facility? Integrate the Leisure centre to a more "usable" facility (either clubrooms, link to skate park area etc).

Better bicycle infrastructure, with a goal of reducing reliance on cars to get around and instead making bikes the primary form of transport. Also, better sustainability and passive design requirements for new houses to minimise energy consumption and promote solar passive design, etc better bike paths/shared bike paths

Better connected more frequent transport connections

Better cycling infrastructure.

Better parking in planning, South Perth train station

Better public transport especially a train station in South Perth

Better streetscape to encourage local flora to grow and flourish

Bike paths and bike lanes critical.

Building a wall along the freeway to increase safety for residents -Shelter from the sun along the foreshore from Narrows to Mends St -playground at grassed area opposite the old mill

Car free Saturday afternoon

Cease building high-rise and high-density buildings and SAVE THE TREES FOR WHAT LITTLE WILDLIFE REMAINS IN WHAT WAS ONCE AN APPEALING TREE-LINED SHIRE!

Change proposed re-zonings to accommodate lower height and density, separate dwellings rather than higher rise

Cheaper solar power

Cheaper tip fees

City of South Perth is a residential area. Retain and enhance our open space is vital, however, this should not be taken to mean high-rise development or multi-level development or large shopping centres. We require more recreational facilities and single storey facilities for promote lifestyles e.g. - cafes in our public open green spaces with free parking for our park areas so the areas can be utilized and promoted for lifestyle family recreational living. City of South Perth is unique with the public open spaces, foreshore access to the river and close vicinity to the CBD and to the freeway giving quick access to many other suburbs. When you promote a family outdoor recreational lifestyle for a suburb, the suburb is well sort after because of those features. If you destroy that village atmosphere, and provide no street parking, free parking around parklands and access to the river, you find those areas are not utilized and the families are not attracted to enjoy those facilities because they are not prepared to pay for parking. To maintain our public open spaces and make it viable, we need to ensure we attract family living. South Perth is well catered for kindergartens, day-care, primary, secondary and university so we need to provide family residential living to attract young families to keep and retain the residential family atmosphere and lifestyle. Smaller blocks with

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terrace style homes are the way to go as most people today are time poor to garden and why garden when the City of South Perth has such vast public open green spaces to enjoy.

Close all Pedestrians Access Walkways in Karawara.

Commitment to more shade along Foreshore through policies and lobby State Government for retention of trees on land to be developed in legislation. Introduce FOGO. Incentives for residents to think more sustainably about the environment - starting with what they do around the home. Community gardens.

Compost bins for food and green waste

Composting bins added to recycle and general rubbish

Continue to improve our bike path infrastructure to ensure all suburbs are accessible by bike.

CoSP has the spaces and the funds to become a leader in renewable energy installations by local governments, potentially in all four of the important key areas, solar panels, wind turbines (in the Swan River), battery installations, and EV charging points. Bold commitments to sustainability in energy could help put CoSP "on the map", for example utilise Cities Power Partnership, https://citiespowerpartnership.org.au/2020/10/21/report-clean-jobs-for-communities-how-local-governments-can-create-sustainable-strong-economies/

Council support for composting, worm farming plus introduce green bins etc

create a food waste recycling and community garden area for people in apartments and encourage those in apartments to create this space themselves. Undertake recycling education for the community i.e. the yellow bin contents, better signage on bins and more widespread information in multi-language friendly easy to understand signage. Don't build so many huge high-rise apartments which undermine the water table, create excess sewerage and vehicle pollution to our small area! CREATING A LEAFIER ENVIORNMENT IN AND AROUND COMO AND GETTING THE FERRY UP AND RUNNING FROM THE CANNING BRIDGE.

Creating more open space.

Creating smaller local 'village' hubs and community identities within the larger City of South Perth. Have identities built around districts - Preston St Hub, Angelo St Hub, Mends St Hub etc. Have sustainability grants around community engagement for arts evenings, community gardens, pop up shops and galleries negotiated with empty shops / landlords.

Developers create chaos around the area e.g. look at the area around the post office which could go on for years. Keep the developers in check to minimise areas to be fenced off, lessen disruption and frown on blocking road lanes during the day.

Do not allow beautiful old trees to be cut down unnecessarily as has been done at 25 Mt Henry Drive do not allow trees to be removed from house demolition sites

Do we really need to have two Golf courses? How many people actually use them and if most people are not from South Perth, do they bring revenue to the City? They are wonderful areas of land for trees and vegetation so they have value in that way. Could such areas be repurposed as a park, which would cater to all, such as Bold Park in the north. I wish there were several small community swimming pools that were easy to access. They do not have to be grand scale or world class. If swimming in the river is an option, could there be dedicated locations that have low impact on wetlands or foreshore. I am unsure what unique local character means but I would like to see the style of buildings preserved and not replaced by unnecessarily tall buildings that do not suit the neighbourhood (as what seems to be happening in Como/Manning). With planning for more people, how will local businesses and transport options change to match demand? For example, what actions will take place to limit increase pollution or crime. I love the Manning hub of shops, library, and parks. If the RAF goes through, I wonder if that will take away from the smaller community feel and what will happen to the Leisure Centre. I think it's important to offer accessibility by proximity to all and not just have one main hub for all residents.

Don't approve unlimited increased density development within infill areas - use limits to retain neighbourhood character

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Don't overdevelop parks

Dual use bike paths separating cyclists and pedestrians

Easy to use transport that is equivalent to the CAT buses in the City will make an enormous difference. Especially to the elderly population who may no longer wish to drive and the current Transperth bus system does not cater for South Perth travel alone.

Education and more resident's involvement

Education, resources and collaboration

Electric car facilities

Embrace change and new developments to maintain the urban feel as the City feels stuck in the 90s. Encourage environmentally friendly initiatives like biodegradable poo bags, rebates for solar and composting

Encourage day life of people, businesses and institutions

Encourage electric vehicles to reduce pollution and noise. Use the affordable etc integrate local; transport system as a model.

Encourage innovative developments Retain streetscapes where attractive and of value. Consider the needs of local hubs and aid development of these facilities.

Encourage less car use, make a bike hiring facility between South Perth and the City, bike lanes for elite and recreational riders separated

Encourage more verge cultivation and vegetation by subsidising native plants and shrubs. More planting of trees in the large diverse city parks.

Encourage neighbourhoods to undertake sustainable practices like Town of Vic Park and Town of Vincent. Employ more environmental officers that "action" changes in the Town. Plant more trees. Green everything in preparation for climate changes. Only plant endemic species.

Encourage the planting of native trees and shrubs. SPCC planted exotic deciduous trees in the past. Ensuring accessibility is considered in the development of neighbourhoods - are the homes being approved for construction going to be suitable for "aging in place"? Otherwise community networks are lost when people have to move home due to increasing disability. Are all the new apartment blocks going to be suitable for someone with a disability to live it? What impact does increased infill have on amenity, enjoyment of own home, traffic flow, parking on roads. Lighting around access roads to the train station needs urgent attention if wanting to encourage use of Canning Bridge Station/ decrease car use. I don't feel safe walking home along Robert St (riverside) after dark on my own due to large overhanging peppermints along paths and insufficient lighting.

Events

Expand use of the rivers

Extend or widen the foreshore jetty area, so more seats and tables can be seated over the water, and the ferry area is nicer, or covered, especially during the colder and winter months. The playground area to be an environmentally friendly playground, and have more of these throughout South Perth. Better rubbish and recycling bins, also the new project of the cans etc...

Extension of ferry services

Extra bin for households to reduce waste

Fewer high-rise buildings. These will destroy the ethos and feel of South Perth

Fix up what you already have. Parks are run down. More "nature" areas, fenced areas for dogs, toilet and water facilities, improved security CCTV, improve paths, plant more trees, more smaller event activations in the suburbs/streets/parks. Public and community art. Parks are not just for sports!! Focus on improving green areas, particularly those around nature reserves, both in terms of restoration/protection as well as adding infrastructure to improve the quiet enjoyment of wildlife in a natural habitat.

Focus on what connects people naturally

FOGO bins

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Gardening talks or local talks or tours around the community providing information about the history of the suburbs and parks.

Gardening workshops, plant information, workshops on how to be sustainable - grow veggies, recycle, reduce waste, provide organic bins, increase size of recycling bins/recycling every week not fortnightly Get some property recycling in place - partner with green batch or similar to make a real difference - we could get street furniture as a result of our donations. Composting on a large scale! We have huge gardens, let's put the nutrients from fruit veggies back in the ground. Extend our native parklands!! Don't plant trees so far apart, they are not designed to grow like that. We will not lose as many natives if we plant them in the way they prefer to be nurtured. Teach our children about the native flora in our mini native parklands through school programs to foster knowledge and interest in their area.

Getting the community more involved, and educate as to how to preserve the environment and the living standard in South Perth at the moment.

Great face-to-face education with users spotted littering in my parks. Particularly visiting tourists. Perhaps programs interacting with local schools to show the importance of maintaining natural amenities and giving ownership to younger residents to take pride in their neighbourhood.

Greater monitoring of joining and other such disturbances

Green the piazza.

Green waste bins

Green waste collection, recycling materials into new products used in the City of South Perth

Habitat creation and regrowth along the foreshore and Como beach areas. Incentives sustainable retrofitting of existing homes over demolition.

Having a car pull systems to local schools.

Help police some areas overly populated with homes west.

I am a supporter of heritage but also development. The key is to re-establish the business precincts within the City, which will continue to come under more pressure with on-line shopping, high levels of regulation and taxes, Covid-19, a lack of parking, either poor zoning or uninspired developments. Examples of precincts that need renewal include, Ley Street (retail), Thelma Street (retail), Coode Street (retail).

I enjoy the PEACE and QUIET of South Perth and COMO [where I live] and am NOT much into "vibrant hubs" beyond shopping centres! TRANSPORT: Promote the use of BICYCLES with improved CYCLE PATHS and FOOT PATHS. Everyone has a car.....so IMPROVED PARKING FACILITIES would help.

I find local transport interesting, it is often flown but never adequately implemented. Adequate local transport is not a bus every 30 minutes or even every hour after certain hours. Things have improved but do use the trainer I still need to drive to canning bridge station because the bus connections are absolutely non-existent in practical terms. The City has deliberately focus shopping on limited outlets and as such is lacking a dynamic hub. We shall see what happens with Preston Street. Getting in and out of Waterford Village is a huge logistical nightmare because of the traffic issues.

I like the idea of inclusiveness, would be great to help with environmental projects.

I need more direct bus routes, instead of catching more than 2 busses to places

I think the approach for the waste transfer station has been a winner, with many recycling options. However, the early closing on a weekend to the facility is a real issue.

I think we should have more community gardens.

I want to heap praise on the management and staff of the public open spaces - in particular those managing the expansion of the public urban forest. It is being so cleverly and sensitively managed by them, particularly the reforestation of our parks...big thumbs up. With houses having less and less garden area and the increasing numbers of apartment blocks, the public urban forest is such a hugely important asset to the City. Please do keep up this work (which includes ensuring survival of planted trees). I think keeping the amenity of the park areas (as well as care for the environment) through an unrelenting "war on waste" remains a high priority. Thinking sustainability first always in terms of

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everything you set out to do is the key. had you thought about primary energy supply - e.g. powering the suburb on renewables? Big vision I know but what a coup to do it.

Identify buildings of heritage value and protect them from developer destruction. Confine all future medium and or high-rise to specific areas that are already the victim of over development. Name streets or areas to be protected from inappropriate over development and then protect them. Take a look at the waste land created in a section of Swan St for example. How do such ugly and inappropriately high buildings get through council?

I'm a member of a local 'Buy Nothing' group. Opportunities to recycle/donate goods are great for preventing waste and I found also I've met lots of nice neighbours too. this could be done on. larger scale, like the car park sales of the past and reduce the amount of usable goods left on verges. Improve facilities - particularly recreational i.e. the RAF swimming pool.

Improve infrastructure to promote the use of alternative modes of transport to key neighbourhood destinations (schools, shops, open space etc), provide more "sticky" spaces and opportunities for communities to meet/connect (like Mindeerup, and the Inglewood nooks Inglenooks) Improve waste disposal

Incentives for green households, introduction /addition of neighbourhood verge gardens Increase public transport to key hubs. Promote electric scooters and bike paths to reduce car dependence

Increase recycling facilities, e.g. special coffee cup collection facilities so they can be repurposed. Provide bike hire hubs. Set aside areas for community gardens.

Increased public transport systems, particularly in the evenings and weekends. It is difficult to travel around by public transport at these times due to the low frequency of bus services; also, the lack of bus services to meet the trains at Canning Bridge station

Install a plastic bottle and cans recycling hub

Install more water feeding structures for birds in Parks and Reserves.

Introduce similar concepts like City Farm in East Perth and the free tree program like the City of Stirling

It is interesting that we would list as an option encouraging residents to take ownership of the City's natural environment. A great idea but we need the City's ratepaying residents to see the City taking ownership of the maintenance of both bush/parkland areas and the environment most residents see every day- their local street and the street trees within. All very nice aspirational ideas but they must be better looked at in the context of basic service levels. Many residents would acknowledge the importance of the natural environment but feel it is constantly put as a 'Priority 1' by parts of the City staff and a vocal minority of the community. Families and locals require more.

Keep variety of housing options

Keep block sizes from being subdivided too small and too close. Encourage to improve unsightly properties e.g. on Canning Highway between Gwenyfred and Hovia.

Keep open spaces to promote community. Too many developments encourage disconnection

Keep promoting events that support local businesses like the farmers market

Keep the parks, they make the area what it is - beautiful

Kensington needs a hub to encourage neighbourhood initiatives.

Lead by example in actions, and partner with local community groups to achieve

Less building of units. More focus on the protection of character homes.

Less high dentist housing

Less high-rise development. Retain our city as a place where families live and have the space to function as a family. Keep the family home as a family home not a 10th floor apartment.

Let's revitalize the hubs we already have which will save the City money. Re - look at the recycling and rubbish bin method... and bring city wide composting in....

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Limit development. The City is already overdeveloped and overpopulated. There is insufficient green space of the current population. Focus on enhancing walk-ability by creating shady avenues of trees along ALL roads and streets. The temperature is a good 6 degrees less under a tree. Also planting a network of native trees enables biodiversity and wildlife connection through the City. Plant a number of native species in each streetscape to provide food for birds at different times of the year. Actively look for huge areas of wasted concrete and change it to a place for a tree. Plant trees all long the foreshore path to provide shady walking / sitting area. Encourage residents to retain trees in their yard. Provide a rates reduction for people who have trees in their yard / people who look after their verge. Provide subsidized plants for local residents to enhance the biodiversity of the City and encourage local plants growth and local wildlife. Have a canopy goal for the City and meet it. Ensure all new developments MUST have a percentage of green space and must have landscaping requirements that include a proportion of trees.

Limit high-rise developments. City will lose its character and be congested.

Limit high-rise. By all means have low-rise developments, up to say 6 storeys, but don't allow developers to destroy the ambience of South Perth.

Once again, I don't think the previous question was very useful from a community consultation perspective. Different people will have very different interpretations of what some of the predetermined options actually mean. The City should be beautiful - both in terms of its natural environment and its built environment. As far as sustainability goes, the City should ensure that it is financially sustainable, and otherwise just keep doing what it is doing from an environmental perspective. The parks are beautiful, the roads are well-maintained, rubbish is collected efficiently, there are plenty of trees. This isn't an area where the City noticeably needs to improve.

Open-air events like 3 on 3 basketball

Overhaul planning process Easier to get multi story flats approved than a single residence Planning policies and strategies that will encourage sensible re-developments which will improve community amenity and produce high quality developments that can add character and perform better across a range of sustainability metrics.

Plant 5 million trees to lower the heat footprint, provide shade and nice places to go to and enjoy. Plant fruit trees in accessible areas where everyone can benefit. Revitalise lane ways so that they are safe and colourful and a positive contribution to neighbourhoods

Plant more trees as ASAP. Stop planting non-native species. Review the street tree planting program which is currently very poor.

Plant more trees in public spaces, especially the Mends St Piazza. Don't bow to the whims of a few rich NIMBYs: trees produce valuable shade and oxygen, and are far more important than a few people's views. We're also going to need to deal with the rising sea level from climate change already locked in by our past actions, and building up the ecosystems along the foreshore will help prevent erosion, at least in the next few decades before the banks are overwhelmed at the end of the century. To be truly sustainable, the City needs to declare a climate emergency, and then put those words into action. Every project should be considered in terms of its carbon emissions and how they can be offset. We should cease widening roads and start narrowing or closing them, and moving to active transport instead (see transport section). We must act now to preserve endangered local species such as the black cockatoos, by instigating massive planting and rescue programmes. Community gardens and biodiversity activities should be sponsored. Every unused lot should be converted to a bush reserve, and wildlife corridors established wherever possible.

Please keep pedestrians safe from the cyclist and all other two wheeled automobiles.

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Please retain our beautiful natural spaces. They are what make this area so unique and attractive. Pride in being a committed ratepayer

Programs to educate the residents of South Perth on sustainability goals. The programs should be fun and interesting, this can be incorporated into events. Events should also consider younger generations as audiences and consider activities that interest them.

Without these facilities, our stay at the beautiful parks the Council has provided, remains a short stay, thus affecting our exercise, our chance of meeting other South Perth residents and the time to enjoy what our Council has provided for us.

Provide update facilities to those groups needing them, allow growth to occur with permission not expensive consultation processes that draw out processes

Public bins as we get used diapers, drink bottles and rubbish left by people attending the zoo

Public transport is sadly lacking south of the Curtin University Bus Station. Karawara lost its bus in January. The Number 34 does take us from Waterford Shopping Centre to Angelo Street Shopping Centre. South Perth is an old suburb - land isn't available now for a Garden City or Carousel however Angelo Street could receive some innovation. Consideration in planning should always be given to the availability of Banks - it is a big blow to a Senior when banks shut. In 20 years, everyone will be familiar with online but the transition years for seniors are most difficult

Pursue waste recycling targets and initiatives more aggressively with State and Federal agencies; negotiate to install charging points at petrol stations for electric cars; add 'carrots' like rate subsidies to encourage uptake of environmentally appropriate equipment by residents; emulate sustainable models of community housing such as in Fremantle vicinity; promote more appropriate

accommodation models for older singles so as to create more caring and self-helpful modes of living. We don't want to end up in old peoples' homes where profit is the main motive and care is essentially absent.

The bus network is disjointed - the 32 and the 34 only go half way up Mill Point Road. There needs to be a city / South Perth loop. Coode Street Jetty ferry. Train Station.

The City should not be promoting high-rise, multi-unit development within residential areas especially close to schools. Multi-unit developments should be isolated to main roads e.g. highways where there is transport readily available and the highways can cope with the traffic. Residential areas should only have local single residential dwelling car access to prevent problems with residents enjoying visitors coming and being to park on the street. No meter parking should be allowed in residential streets.

The community garden at McDougall park is wonderful and it would be lovely to see more of these community gardens. I have recently seen one at the Men's Shed on Ley Street, but it is fenced off and is not accessible to anyone not involved in the men's shed. Locations could be made available for new community gardens, or residents could use their verges. I would also very much like to see a swimming recreation centre built.

The so called "unique local character" is not a good thing for South Perth. The majority of neighbourhoods are severely under-utilised and underserved. It's about time South Perth grew up and started acting like an urban area, rather than a backwater country town. Look at Preston Street for a prime example. It should be one of the busiest and most popular high streets in Perth. Instead its left to stagnate like swampy water, the theatre is falling apart, being held back by a council too afraid of a vocal minority. Canning Highway is a complete joke, run down homes, the streetscape looks like a rubbish tip. Embarrassing.

The transport system is generally the role of State funding. Improve bicycle and walking infrastructure e.g. via the Bicycle Plan is a joint responsibility of Council and State.

The verge tree planting 'program' in South Perth is a disgrace. Have a look at Canberra, Applecross if you want to see how to make an attractive streetscape. Not the hodgepodge approach that South Perth has taken. Underground Power + Shade = nice verges.

This is too late! You knew what inappropriate high-rise would do to the Peninsula area and yet the City allowed and encouraged unsustainable development where no 'need' was ever justified. The glass and concrete towers have very poor energy ratings, are car-centric and will destroy what were very healthy connected lifestyles. Research shows that housing people at height permanently

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discourages connections and community living. They are not family, child or pet friendly and are certainly not a sustainable form of residential housing. Check the research that tries to convince cities and the government that this type of housing is the way of the future. All that conflicted research is done or commissioned by developers or their lobby groups. The lack of infrastructure support provided by the developments will leave a gaping hole in the City's bottom line. A classic example it the manipulation of green space to justify higher density in the SP ACP. Zoo's and golf courses are not green/open spaces - they can be counted in tree canopy, but not open space for residents. To stop infill and building high-rises that are damaging to the river and ecosystem. Promote more waste free alternatives and proper recycling initiatives.

Achieve better representation by committed people to be on Council - not just those with a commercial interest or a particular 'barrow to push' Create special interest groups, including membership by a representative Councillor, to develop ideas and key themes. Enhance Actually addressing local concerns, not just a leader and staff addressing their own vision

Actually listen to people.

Actually provide facilities that benefit the community.

Advisory groups covering seniors, youth, indigenous, CALD and people with disabilities would be a good start. As would providing more financial support to reshape the economy towards one based on grassroots co-operative businesses.

All leaders need to listen to the Community. Across all suburbs, residents have stated they do not want high-rise development especially with no parking car bays attached to each unit development. By providing high-rise development it places a strain on our local roads which are often surrounded by schools, kindergarten or day care centres. Traffic access and street parking should be a main priority reviewed for any type of development, especially areas surrounding schools. Careful planning is required. Large multi development should be kept for major highways where there is public transport readily available. That is not to say each individual unit still needs car bays attached to the unit as we are a State of car use. All the areas of the City need to retain all the green public open space for recreation lifestyle facilities. To promote the family type of development within the City, all R15 zones should be upgraded to R40 to allow larger blocks to be spilt promoting smaller green title lots, not multi dwelling developments. If all R15 lots are upgraded in the entire City of South Perth, South Perth can achieve the development required within the City, onsite parking will be available for each residential dwelling and the green public open spaces the City of South Perth is renowned for will provide the lifestyle recreational facilities which a larger backyard would normally provide for a residential family.

All residents NOT just the commercial owners, the actual users and people who pay rates. Council needs to remember it is elected and it governs for all not just its sponsors and financial backers during elections. Some past decisions have been questionable and appalling. Watching with interest. Allocate funds for local residents to invest into sustainable homes, electric cars, solar panels, etc. So

many products are available in Europe at a fraction of the cost.

An environmentally conscious one that respects the native environment and encourages quiet in suburbs so native animals can exist.

Approach leaders within different organisations, villages etc.

Ask residents what they want i.e. connect more.

Be leaders. Leaders guide and support people to achieve their dreams, they don't do it for them.

Be people focussed, not business and development

Be responsible for the design of new buildings enforcing and promoting the buildings to be equipped with modern day design to enhance sustainability, energy efficiency and environmentally friendly. Be transparent and available at functions e.g. Manning Markets

Behave more like a mastiff and less like a poodle.

Being a visionary local government means pushing forward and serving your constituents. Being stuck in a 1960's mindset doesn't cut the mustard anymore. South Perth shouldn't be afraid of change, the positives far outweigh the negatives in the majority of cases.

Do not be afraid to emulate good models and examples in operation elsewhere if they are appropriate and transferable to this city. Look at where we are going socially and environmentally (hard times are certainly ahead) and be courageous in decision-making.

Do not be too quick to leave your personal mark. Consolidation of existing practices and visions has a place in society. A steady as she goes approach has a lot of merit. Visions and influences can sometimes produce pies in the sky or projects and development that look grand and breathtaking. At what cost?

Don't give in to overdevelopment as a quick revenue creator

Easy access to the Mayor or councillors when I want to voice an opinion

Education of councillors by City employees

Embrace environmental initiatives - see other councils for the work they put into creating a sustainable community. Have a clear view of how the City intends to move forward with reduction of car reliance and congestion and ensure that the City implements the strategy at every opportunity. Employ more females into the Council roles.

Employ motivated, skilled and well-spoken people in environmental jobs within Council. Encourage local people to undertake training and become positive environmentalists in the City.

Employ people who have revitalised other areas e.g. East Perth

Empower the people with options and funding opportunities to take action. While I have joined online safety watch groups, I am still unsure what actions I can take to actually contribute to improving safety. A committed leader can work with the people to make sure that their voices are heard and actions can be taken to address issues. But it comes down to the people working and inhabiting the City to make sure that the community is blossoming in a way that is aligned with their values. I would like more opportunities to get to know other residents for growing and improving the community. Right now, I feel like there aren't clear ways to do this. I am unsure how my local elected counsel ward represents our views. Could council meetings be live streamed so we could know what happens? This has been done by others and helps connect people with what happens during meetings if they are not comfortable attending in person.

Encourage more people, businesses and services to come to the City

Establish official advisory groups, which are more formal than community groups, and have codes of conduct and terms of reference. Informal community groups can be easily dominated by NIMBYs and bullies, which make them a dangerous choice to rely on for decision making. Likewise, a committed leader may have trouble coming up with enough ideas and may be paralysed by trying to satisfy everyone. Advisory groups allow concerned citizens to interact directly with the City and make informed choices, as well as distribute information amongst the community. Please reach out to the City of Canning, who established advisory groups several years ago and have had much success. Also, if the leadership team can only come up with two choices to priorities shows me that you have put very little thought into this aspiration and believe that you have very little to improve. Not very "visionary"

Get the local rotary clubs, support groups, hubs more involved in helping great a better local government. they are after all at the front of the issues and see it every day in what they do. Getting back to what local government is supposed to do - looking after the interests of the residents

and ratepayers. Poor decisions keep being made with infrastructure - e.g. John McGrath Building. Poorly planned. Bad enough that an architect presented the plans, but DREADFUL that someone in the CoSP approved them. It was obvious that the building was lacking. Same with the Mends Street situation. It is a hot, useless area. There was so much that it could have been. Who is making these decisions. Whoever it is, should not be allowed to make any more decisions.

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Hmm - well a committed leader is very important but visionary leading are the key words. That takes courage and charisma.

Holding open forums for residents to interact Hearing from the leaders on a casual level (Jacinda Ardern jumping on FB live after a press conference to explain things more casually is awesome) Making a positive and noticeable change in the community

I am very conservativeI do NOT want VISIONARY ACTIVITIES....because they always go with UNFORSEEN HIGH EXPENSES which the VISIONARY failed to ENVISION!

I attended the community meetings during the consultation phase of the amendments to planning for Preston St. It was interesting how many people didn't know about the development, despite shopping frequently in Preston St. because signage of the development was inadequate. The one near the Cygnet was partially obscured by a tree and the one into the entrance to the parking area was not well positioned, as it was right near the busy driveway. Some residents commented that it seemed they were ill placed deliberately so that residents didn't see them! Attending these meetings made me feel that perhaps I was being heard, re my concerns with the heights of the apartments, traffic and other issues. Residents feel connected to their local govt. if they're visible. Ward members were visible during the election phase but I haven't seen them since.

I believe that local resident needs should be put ahead of commercial profit, developer profit and external to South Perth community demands. South Perth needs to look after who lives here first and foremost.

I spoke with Greg Milner last election in front of my home and he said that he was more concerned about the negative impact a rec centre would have on local. businesses already providing services. Gyms, consultation-based professionals. Seems he is more concerned with himself and the rec centre I think if we were treated as residents, not just ratepayers that would be a good start. I don't believe that the staff at the council listen, respond or act appropriately when we call to make observations, or suggestions. We are either dismissed or treated quite rudely by the council staff on occasions. I think it is very difficult for counsellors, to start with they have to content with a huge NIMBY effort. Then over the years there has been protection of certain vested interests. I guess it's up to us to research who we are voting for and to vote for good people. Maybe more wards and one representative from each ward would help with this.

I think the Council is disconnected from the community and on the few occasions that I raise issues with the Council it's a matter for other Govt agencies; e.g. 1. the need for pedestrian lights at the intersection of Mill Point Road and Labouchere Road. Council Response: contact Main Roads. 2. Need to reduce the increasing incidence of hooning in South Perth of a night time. Council response: contact the police.

I would like local government to be smaller - do the basics well and leave businesses alone

If the local government was more in touch with your citizen

If we are a safe community with positive street lighting, safe pathways, good transport and we show leadership in an environment reducing carbon footprint people will want to live in South Perth. Innovation. investigate opportunities for South Perth to be a leader rather than languishing behind other less wealthy councils

Intelligent authentic visionary officers

involving local schools and nursing homes

It feels like the local government isn't listening. The call for more trees is an example.

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It is always necessary to have a Mayor/Leader who understands, visits and joins in with all community neighbourhood hubs. His Councillors for the Districts of South Perth should also be involved with their neighbourhood hubs within their District and understand their needs.

It is important for our leaders to act on behalf of our residents, but also to be facilitating good planning in all areas of local government. As quoted by Mr Eric Lumsden " Good planning is not about personal interest- it has regard for it, but...it must be in the wider public interest today and tomorrow. It needs to be a group of all ages that help make the decisions on the City of South Perth not just one person.

Once again, I can't see how the previous question was very useful from a community consultation perspective. There are only two pre-determined options to rank. The City should then prioritise those outcomes, and work towards achieving those outcomes, in order of priority. At present, it's not clear whether the City knows what activities deliver the best returns for the community. This leads to the City stretching itself too thin trying to be "all things to all people".

Set rates at an affordable amount rather than setting them at the highest amount council feels the community can bear. I would like my rates used wisely and not wastefully.

Show clear connections between the City's goals in planning documents and the actions of the "Visionary and Influential local government". Anticipate trends. COVID will influence a hollowing out of the Perth centre city with working from home, 3-day weeks etc. This will affect South Perth as an adjacent area, potentially reducing traffic, property values and vacancies in due course. Sections in US cities became slums because of 'white flight'. Electronics and different human resource practices will mean that Perth City will lose occupancy and South Perth with it. In this case it would be electronics and realisation that staff don't have to be in place 5 days a week.

Simplify or eliminate council bureaucracy wherever possible

Smarter, more debate about community issues - this is currently lacking due to too few councillors So far, the City seems to be a road block to developments and not progressive. It should facilitate

these changes on behalf of the community and the future generations living here Someone who is in touch with the important issues - climate change action and economic stability.

Engagement with local community groups - we had the mayoral candidates at our local group around election time but then they drop off and we don't hear from them again.

South Perth does have a well organised, peaceful feel, completely different to Vic Park that has a vibrancy and with its shopping strip a draw card. We can't compete on those grounds. Our foreshore is a great draw card. Interstate and International visitors want to learn about the Whadjuk history - the naming of indigenous plant and animal species, the song lines that belong here, the stories of important Whadjuk leaders. Enhance and maintain Milyu along the Como foreshore. That is a great asset but it looks tired at the moment. The concept of the Aquatic Centre near Curtin and the Collier Golf Course would also be a great draw card. We should focus on that, perhaps build it in stages? Speed the approval notices for developments

Speeding up response times on residential property approvals

Spend more time door knocking around the electorate/ talking to people at events etc, not just before Council elections.

Stop corruption

Strong council that listens to the community.

Support and assist residents and community groups to achieve local growth and improvement Support local businesses

Supportive and well seen in the local community

Take notice of the residents and what they want. Not developers.

Takes a long-term strategic perspective - recognising the interconnections between safety, health, transport etc

The City of South Perth use a large volunteer group - these volunteers are often reluctant to volunteer in other smaller groups, be mindful that as the City increases its need for volunteers to operate their facilities and hubs, smaller community-based groups are also needing volunteers. We are all trying to work from the same pool.

The Council should not go outside its accepted purpose

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These should be basic fundamentals of good local government governance.

To get everyone involved with the community especially young people as they are the people of the future.

Transparency of future planning. It is very difficult to work out what the council is doing as the community notification is laborious and refers to different sections that prove difficult to find. More point form, transparent and factual information would be great. More helpfulness and openness to answering questions would be great. We find different people are told different things by different council planners. Uniformity and open communication would improve this problem.

Transparency, engagement with community (various groups) and setting clear vision and goals Try listening to residents instead of producing more forms to fill in.

Understand what a majority voice is. Don't act on the noisy minority demands.

Vision for the City rather than personal self

Walk the talk

We could do with something to help bridge the gap between people of different social classes. Most days one South Perth Facebook page has reports of a 'suspicious' person, usually because they are wearing a hoodie. Not everyone who walks down the street is casing it for a burglary but it seems many residents in S Perth are most concerned about this!

We have been extremely disappointed in the senior leadership of the City for a number of years. 10-12 years ago, the leadership pushed the City into a vision for the City that very few residents knew about agreed with. It may have suited their particular ideals and ambitions, but the consequences of those very poor decisions are now becoming a reality. Leaders need to know their people, need to know the potential of the whole city and should not be influenced by bullies and profiteers, be they private or government. Leaders should be open and transparent and take people along the journey of progress not trick them or manipulate them into a preconceived plan.

We have very unique amenities so greater access and focus on them.

We have worked hard and are fortunate to live in such a lovely area. However, I believe that residents are not necessarily looked upon favourably and are considered an imposition when making decisions. It appears that the only times we hear from local councillors is when they want to become elected. As an example, our local area was invited to make comment on the alterations to the South Perth Hospital but our comments were not taken on board and no feedback was provided to us.

We need a local swimming pool and more involvement with the young community members We need less Councillors.

What is exactly a vision for the City? Who defines it? How it is lived?

What leader are you referring to? I assume this should be the Mayor, all Councillors, The CEO and all senior Council Officers who ACT ON BEHALF OF ALL RESIDENTS

When choosing the accoutrements that our Council representatives receive, I would like cost to be the greatest consideration, not status. By considering cost first, we residents will witness that our rates are not being spent on frivolous items, but rather on the community that the Council represents.

Where a resident has expertise that the City officers would prefer to disregard, allow and encourage such people to petition the council with a one-person petition to request council to set up a citizens' advisory group in their area of interest. Thus, the City has living here the former State Botanist who offered to help with better street tree selections and who was ignored). The City has had advisory groups in the past (e.g. the Travelsmart Advisory Group and the Sustainability Advisory Group. These advisory groups should have the right to report to councillors via the CEO.

Work more closely with the State Government to leverage South Perth's unique advantages as the gateway to the Perth CBD.

Yes, a committed leader is essential, but also the team that lies behind him.

You are doing a great job currently

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You cannot have support to community groups without a committed leader

You only have to look at the USA to see what happens if you have a committed leader that acts on behalf of residents (Donald Trump). The City of South Perth needs a strong Council, good governance, a skills and experienced CEO that they deliver the vison of the council with the support of the City of South Perth staff.

Emulate sustainable models of community housing such as in Fremantle vicinity; promote more appropriate accommodation models for older singles to create more caring and self-helpful modes of living. Retirement /over 55 complexes in the Manning area are 'old style' and should be reviewed to see if they can be retrofitted to achieve some of these aims

The upgrade to the Ernest Johnson Oval was almost fantastic. The play and fitness equipment are great. However, the lack of toilet facilities is extremely disappointing (certainly badly planned on that one). The kiosk eventually received an awning - but is badly planned facing the oncoming weather. and consideration should be made to increase the opening times of this facility and incorporate a cafe to encourage use of the facility. (see Mills Park in Beckenham as an example for not only a cafe facility but also a fantastic playground for families)

To help the change to take place.

Traffic management and areas which are being developed need better planning, signage and control mechanisms for the residents. We all understand that building and maintenance takes time and coordination - but we are generally not informed, and the traffic management appears sometimes hit-and-miss (and the staff are generally very rude).
